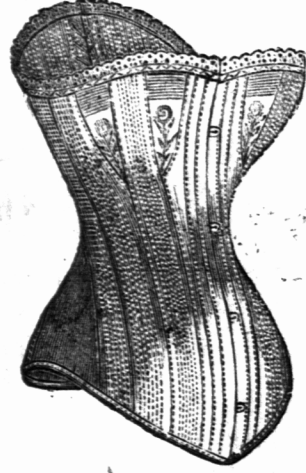

NATURAL HISTORY AND ANTIQUARIAN SOCIETY.—Mr. James Fitt (Florist), will give a short address on Flowers and Flower Culture in parlor of the Y. M. C. A. this evening, at 8 o'clock.

HON. JAS. W. RICHARDS was a passenger by the special train to Cape Traverse last night enroute for a visit to Boston, New York, Washington and other American cities. His brother, Mr. John Richards, who has lately been visiting in Washington, D. C., will meet him in Boston and accompany him. Mr. Richards will be absent about ten days.

SCHOOL BOARD MEETING

The regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The total enrollment for the past month was 1370; percentage of attendance, 82; number of cases of corporal punishment, 11; number of cases of tardiness, 322; number who fell below the average in grading, 92. The following teachers reported no cases of tardiness for the month.—Miss McKinnon, Miss Snaddon, Miss Scott, Mr. M. W. Smith, Miss Wadman, Mr. Yeo and Mr. Bowness. The highest percentage of attendance for the month in Prince st. school was made by Miss Harris's department, 90; highest in Queen's square, Principal Landrigan's, 90; highest in West Kent Mr. Bowness', 90.

Miss Minnie Kelly was appointed on the teaching staff of Queen's Square school, for the new department about to be opened.

A committee from the City Council waited on the Board, according to a resolution passed by the Council at their last meeting, and heard the explanation of the Board re increased estimates. In reference to the resolution, passed by the Council vesting the title of West Kent school in the City Council, the following resolution was passed by the Board:—

Resolved, That Messrs. Blanchard, Stewart and McLeod, be appointed a committee to confer with a representative of the City Council to deliberate upon and draw up a bill to carry out the suggestion of the City Council with reference to the title of West Kent school building which bill to be laid before the School Board at a future sitting.
