In Memoriam

JOHN A. HYDE

The following news item clipped from a Boston paper will be of interest to Island relatives and friends.

Funeral services for John A. Hyde of 341 Harvard Street, Wollaston, a former manager of the claim and legal departments of Boston Consolidated Gas company, who died in Wollaston on Wednesday, were held this afternoon at the Waterman Chapel, 495 Commonwealth Avenue, Boston.

Burial was at Cedar Grove cemetery, Dorchester.

Mr. Hyde was the husband of Mrs. Mary A. Hyde of Wollaston. He was born in Clyde River, P. E. I., and came to Boston as a young man. During his active life he made many contacts, and was widely known among fraternal and legal circles of Boston and Quincy.

He was a member of Quincey lodge of Elks, Mt. Lebanon lodge, A. F. and A. M., Siloam lodge, I. O. O. F., Winter Hill lodge, Knights of Pythias, and Aleppo Temple of Boston.

Mr. Hyde retired recently from the Boston Consolidated Gas company where he had been employed for the past 35 years. Starting as a young man in the claim department, he reached the age of retirement as the manager of the claim and legal departments.

Surviving is his wife, Mrs. Mary A. Hyde; three brothers, George of Vancouver, B. C.; Charles S. of Wollaston; and three sisters, Mrs. Albert Martin of Boston, Mrs. John Nantague of Vancouver, B. C., and Mrs. Robert Walker of Summerside, P. E. I.

Life Insurance Grows In Canada

TORONTO, Oct. 22—An improvement of over seven percent in new orders of life insurance sales in Canada and Newfoundland for the first nine months of this year, compared with the same period in 1936, is revealed in figures compiled by the Life Insurance Sales Research Bureau and given out today by the Canadian Life Insurance Officers' Association. Total sales for the period amounted to \$280,885,000 as compared with \$262,300,000 to September 30th, 1936, Ontario leading all provinces with over \$124,000,000 of new business and Quebec second with over \$78,500,000. The highest percentage of improvement was shown in Newfoundland, up 26 1/2 per cent.

Detailed sales by provinces for the nine months, based on returns by 18 companies having 87 per cent of the total insurance in force, excluding of fire insurance, annuities, pension bonds without insurance, reinsurance, revivals, etc., were as follows:—

The volume of new ordinary business for the month of September alone totalled over \$27,500,000, an increase of approximately 5 1/2 per cent, compared with the same month last year. The feature of the month's business was the remarkable improvement shown in Alberta, where sales were up 23 1/2 per cent as compared with September, 1936.

Horse - breeding Policies Discussed

FREDERICTON, N. B., Oct. 2—(CP)—A conference of Maritime agriculture officials was held here today when future horse breeding policies for the three provinces were discussed with J. T. McCallum, chief of the horse division, livestock branch, Ottawa.

Tonight Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture for New Brunswick, said that a committee comprising Stanley Wood, superintendent of livestock, provincial department of agriculture, Eric Boulden, livestock superintendent Nova Scotia department of agriculture and W. R. Shaw, deputy minister of agriculture for Prince Edward Island, had been chosen, to make a further study of the matter for consideration at another meeting.

Others present today included Lyman C. Chapman, principal of the Nova Scotia agricultural college, W. W. Baird, superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Farm at Nappan, N. S., and F. Waldo Walsh, director of Marketing, Halifax.

Countervailing Duties Imposed On N. S. Fish

WASHINGTON, Oct. 26—(AP)—The United States Treasury announced tonight it had imposed countervailing duties against imports of dried, salted fish from Nova Scotia.

Countervailing duties are extra tariff imposts assessed against products which the treasury determines have been subsidized by foreign governments.

Officials said an investigation disclosed that a bounty on dried, salted fish was being paid in Nova Scotia.

The countervailing duties against these imports have not been fixed, officials said, but will be determined as imports come in on the basis of bounties paid in Nova Scotia.

NOT SERIOUSLY AFFECTED

HALIFAX, Oct. 26—(CP)—Action of the United States Treasury in imposing countervailing duties against imports of dried, salted fish from Nova Scotia, was unlikely to have any serious effect on the industry, it was believed here tonight.

Premier A. L. Macdonald whose government announced last June it was providing fishermen's assistance sums on dried fish, said: "It is not likely that any dried, salted fish on which a bonus had been paid by the Nova Scotia Government could be exported to the United States in amounts of fish taken in other areas, such as Newfoundland for example, came into Nova Scotia for shipment and any shipments to the United States from Nova Scotia could be made from this supply, the Premier said.

He did not believe the American Government would impose countervailing duties on such shipments.

Italian Socialists Escape From Prison

PARIS, Oct. 25—(AP)—The escape of the Italian Socialist, Giacomo Costa and four companions from an Italian prison on the Island of Lampedusa in the Mediterranean was reported today by the Leftist newspaper Ce Sol in a dispatch from Tunis.

The newspaper said the group landed on the Tunisian coast after two days in an open boat without food. Costa, once a Socialist Deputy in Italy, had been imprisoned at Lampedusa since March, 1936.

Anti-Serum For Sick Horses Available

WINNIPEG, Oct. 26—Effective-ness of anti-serum and existence of an unknown virus have been established by Dean Alfred Savage of the Agricultural Department, University of Manitoba this summer.

The report was submitted to Hon. D. L. Campbell, Manitoba Agricultural Minister, today.

Experiments with guinea pigs established that the disease was transferable from one guinea pig to another; that a virus too small to be seen with a microscope and capable of passing through filters was responsible for the disease; and that anti-serum prevented development of the disease.

The report said there are two strains of virus, eastern and western, with the eastern strain the more virulent.

Animals immunized against the eastern strain may fail to break down under the western virus but those immunized against the western strain will break down when infected with the eastern type.

Girl Guide News

Looking at New England

(Canadian Press)

BOSTON, Oct. 26—Dr. Willis B. Moore, active and alert and being his 82 years is one of the world's most unusual travellers. Eleven years ago after a lifetime practising in Kentville, N. S., he decided to retire and instead of settling down in an armchair and toasting his toes by the hearth he started out to trot around the globe.

With his wife as his constant companion he has three times encircled the world. The elderly couple have stopped off in practically every country, visited in 38 states of the union, every province of Canada. They have put 160,000 miles behind them. Nothing very unusual in that but here is the point whereby Dr. Moore gratifies what he terms "my vanity of senility."

The globe-trotting Nova Scotians never travel by night. They make their trips in easy short stages and see far more of the country as they go. After all they have been eleven years at it and you can see a lot of world in eleven years.

"It may be bad business for the pullman company," the genial doctor laughed softly. "But these people who travel by airplane and in sleeping cars don't really see the country. Travelling is a serious business and you can't do it like an ostrich with your head buried in the sand—or a pullman pillow. We've always kept our eyes open."

His inquiries at the different world travel bureaus convinced him they had established a record and that they were the only globe trotters who did all their travelling by day.

The old adage about a rolling stone gathering no moss may be true but a professional man like Dr. Moore, a graduate of Dalhousie University and a keen observer of world politics has gathered some very definite opinions on democracy, Fascism and Communism in the odd corners of the globe.

He was surgeon for the old Annapolis-Windsor railway then the Dominion Atlantic and later the Canadian Pacific during his long term as a Kentville practitioner. His father was a member of the Nova Scotia Legislature for 35 years. He remembers Howe and Tupper and the battle for Confederation and recounts old political fights in Nova Scotia of three-quarters of a century ago as if it all happened last week. When he grew tired of doling out pills and hitching old dobbin to plow through the snow, he decided to take life easy.

But a doctor can never stop diagnosing. He found a sick world, a world of warring factions where hates, jealousies, envy and personal ambitions continually beckoned to the war god Mars.

"My son, Dr. Hugh Moore who is an officer in the Royal Army Medical Corps has just been called from Belfast to Hong Kong."
