## THE COOK'S CORNER

**ROSE CURLS**

4 egg yolks  
1 tablespoon vinegar  
1 tablespoon cream  
1 tablespoon sugar  
1-4 teaspoon salt

**Method:** Beat the egg yolks and add the vinegar, sugar and cream. Beat until smooth, then add the salt and enough flour to make a dough that can be rolled out easily.

Turn onto a light floured pastry cloth and roll thin. Cut with a small, floured biscuit cutter. Set 3 or 4 of these, one on top of the other and press a dent in the centre, deep enough to hold them firmly together. Snip around the edge in about 6 places, making cuts about 1-2-inch deep.

Separate the petals slightly and drop them into deep, hot fat. Fry them until they are nice and brown, then lift out carefully and drain on unglazed paper. Drop a bit of bright red jelly into the centre of each one, and when cold, dust lightly with icing sugar.

You have to press the centres well together, so they won't separate in frying, and lift them out carefully, or they'll break while they are still warm. But, treated carefully, they are very attractive and not hard to do.

**CARAMEL APPLE PIE**

4 or 5 apples  
1 cup brown sugar  
2 tablespoons flour  
1-2 cup butter

**Pastry**  
Method: Line a fairly deep pie pan with a nice, rich pastry dough. Peel and slice the apples thin and arrange them in the pie shell, enough to fill it well.

Melt the butter in a heavy skillet and add the sugar and

Q. How can I afford quick relief to a painful burn?

A. A solution of equal parts of Epsom salts and baking soda will usually prove effective.

Q. How can I remove the shine from a coat collar?

A. Sponge the collar with a cloth moistened in ammonia or vinegar. To clean it, rub briskly with an old toothbrush dipped in naphtha or any cleaning solution.

Q. How can I measure molasses accurately without the syrup sticking to the spoon or cup?

A. Dip the cup or spoon into scalding water before measuring.

Q. Flour mixed. Heat slowly until this melts, then pour over the apples in the pie. Bake in a hot 425 deg. F. oven for about 10 minutes, then reduce the heat and continue to bake until the apples are tender and the crust nicely browned.

### Girls in the "Teen Age Make a Mistake in Keeping Steady Company With One Boy or Allowing Their Time to be Monopolized, for This Eliminates Their Chances for Marriage
