Alleged Black-mailer Is Arrested

OTTAWA, Jan. 13.—(O.P.)—Arrested as he hovered over a post office waste basket in which a local merchant had been directed to deposit \$1,000 in bills under threat of dire consequences, Lawrence Munro, 34, was in jail tonight charged with attempting to extort money by menace.

Police claimed they had a confession, J. Fred Miles, Sydney grocer, was the intended victim of the scheme. He received an unsigned letter, written on a bit of copy paper obtained from some unknown source, which directed him where to place the money, warned him against informing the police and promised repayment in a year.

Speeding Up Pension Matters

OTTAWA, Jan. 13.—Suggestions for improving the operation of the machinery which controls pension matters, together with recommendations designed to speed up that operation and at the same time institute changes to that end were heard by the joint committee investigating administration of the pension act from a number of witnesses here today.

Five executives of the Canadian Legion presented their testimony. Two were from British Columbia, Col. W. W. Foster, D.S.O., and T. A. Barnard; two from Ontario, Lieut. Col. F. J. Picking, of St. Thomas, and MacInlyre Hood, Ottawa, while Alex. Alwker, of Calgary voiced the sentiments of Alberta.

That the present tribunal be resolved into ten regional tribunals, each a quorum of one, was a suggestion urged by Mr. Hood. He also stressed that some intermediate body should be set up in order to decide whether a case decided upon by the tribunal may or may not be appealed. Mr. Hood frowned on the frequency with which appeals were taken by the Board of Pension Commissioners to the present Appeal Court, and also the large proportion of those appeals that were allowed.

HOCKEY

Playing the third overtime game in six starts, the Kensington Granites went down to defeat at the hands of the Bedque Beavers in the Kensington Arena, Wednesday, Jan. 11th. Considering the soft ice surface, the game produced a fair amount of team play, but the sniping was particularly weird, both sextets missing open nets on numerous occasions. E. Bernard on right wing for the home squad, got the only counter in the initial period when he coasted down the right boards, eluded the left defence, took plenty of time, and picked the upper left hand corner of the net.

Each team tallied once in the second session, E. Gaudet going in fast to beat Hickey on W. Burns' rebound and I. Darrach taking a pretty pass from Wedlock well over the blue line, and drilling a fast one past Arsenault in the Beaver net.

CLUB WORK EFFECTIVE

Five points which receive special attention in connection with Boys' and Girls' Swine Club work in the carrying out of which the federal and provincial Departments of Agriculture co-operate, are detailed as follows:—

- 1—The location and distribution to club members of young pigs of good bacon type and breeding. Of these, many of the best females are kept over for breeding purposes.
- 2—The giving of practical instruction to club members at their homes or through lectures at club meetings.
- 3—The distribution of printed or mimeographed information regarding the breeding, feeding, management, judging and marketing of swine.
- 4—The arrangement and conduct of judging and other forms of demonstrations.
- 5—The securing of good bacon type pigs for club districts.

At a recent meeting of the pure bred Yorkshire breeders of Marshfield and vicinity a Club was organized for the purpose of entering a number of sows in the Advanced Registry as carried on under the Dominion Live Stock Branch.

STRANGERS AND VISITORS CORDIALLY INVITED.

Five Men Are Rescued From Certain Doom

(Canadian Press)

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Jan. 13.—Drifting helplessly into the clutches of the dreaded Sargasso Sea, five men in a small, disabled motor boat were rescued from what appeared to be certain doom among the hulks of old wooden ships covered with seaweed and barnacles. Details of the rescue by the Pure Oil Company steamship W. F. Burdell were received here today from Captain Holly Patchell, formerly of Saint John, who was serving as second officer on the steamer and was the first to sight distress signals from the small craft.

With high seas running, the rescue was a thrilling one. After the motor boat set out from Savannah, Go., its engine broke down. The strong Gulf Stream had swept the little craft 300 miles from home. Horror-stricken, the five men found themselves drifting steadily toward the "graveyard of lost ships." Once within the expanse of floating seaweed they knew hope must be abandoned.

Then the W. F. Burdell appeared on the horizon. An old blanket was displayed from the helples craft and its occupants frantically waved a shirt. The signals were seen by Captain Patchell. The steamer's course was changed. Captain G. Rodney Robinson, the commanding officer, had his ship brought to windward of the motor boat to make shelter and oil was dumped overboard to calm the seas. A line to the small boat resulted in all the men reaching the steamer safely. They were fed and given medical attention, and relatives were informed of their safety.
