VETERAN ARMY OFFICER RETIRES.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 26—With a record of forty years of honorable and efficient service, Col. Calvin D. Cowles, until recently in command of the 5th Infantry at Plattsburgh barracks, was placed on a retired list of the army today on account of age. Col. Cowles is from North Carolina and was graduated from the United States Military Academy in 1873. During the Spanish war he was lieutenant colonel of the 1st North Carolina Volunteer Infantry. Otherwise his entire service has been with the infantry of the regular establishment.

SIOUX CITY, Ia., June 26—The nineteenth annual meeting of the Iowa State Bar association was opened here today with a large and representative attendance of lawyers and jurists. Lieutenant Governor Harding welcomed the visitors and Judge Martin J. Wade of Iowa City responded.
