BIG MERGER IN PROCESS.

OTTAWA, Oct 1—It is said that an effort is being made to bring together the coal companies in Nova Scotia, the combined capital to be \$40,000,000.

Whether the scheme is intended to include the Dominion Coal Company is not certain.

The capital of the Dominion Coal Co. alone, is \$23,000,000, including its bonds, so that it is possible the merger of coal companies does not include the big coal company.

SUBSIDIZE SHIPYARDS TO BE DEMANDED.

OTTAWA, Oct 1—A subsidized ship-building industry in Canada was one of the things the Canadian Federation of Labor has decided to secure. The fact that Canadian ships have to be constructed in other countries was depreciated, and it has been decided to ask the Dominion Government to take action to have shipyards established in Canada.

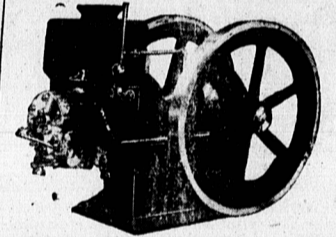
