Although unable for some time to take a very active part in church matters, his zeal for the doctrine and order of his church never failed, and many were benefited by his wise counsel and religious conversation.

His family and friends are comforted in their bereavement by the memory of a life enriched by the knowledge of the love of Christ, and of a departure which was a passing into glory. 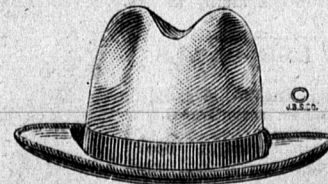
