**PREPARING FOR NEW CAPITAL.**

CALCUTTA, Aug. 20 (Special)—The temporary office and quarters required to accommodate the personnel of the Government of India while New Delhi is in the building are being run up at high working pressure. Contractors and an army of masons, carpenters, and coolies are busy on the Metcalfe House estate and elsewhere. There is possibility that a light railway may be laid down later on, so as to give easy means of communication between temporary and New Delhi.

The lines of Indian infants in Daryaganj will eventually be vacated, as the cantonments are built, and thus one of the most unhealthy sites within the walls can be turned into an open space, a "lung" for the city which it sadly needs.

**IRISH AND SUFFRAGETTES.**

DUBLIN, Aug. 20 (Special)—A case which was heard in the Northern Police Court the other day illustrates the feeling of the working classes in Dublin towards militant women suffragettes. The police charged two women, named Ellen Ahern and Anne Dowdall, and a messenger, named Patrick O'Connor, with having assaulted a young woman, named Eileen Nolan, who lives near Celbridge, County Kildare, at Summerhill, and a woman named Mary Dowdall was charged with having attempted to rescue Anne Dowdall when under arrest.

It appeared that Miss Nolan had come to Dublin on business and when passing along Summerhill some one shouted "She's a Suffragette." A crowd of two hundred persons collected and mobbed her, and when she tried to escape into the post office Ellen Ahern struck her in the face and knocked her down. Miss Nolan got up and again ran towards the post office, but she was caught by the hair and pulled back. Some women who were leaving the post office ran to Miss Nolan's assistance and brought her into the post office. The crowd endeavored to follow, but were prevented by the police who had then arrived. Patrick O'Connor was said to have thrown a stone at Miss Nolan while she was being taken to the police station for protection.

**THIRTY YEARS IN PRISON.**

MILAN, Aug. 21 (Special)—The great Arvedi trial has come to an end with a sentence of 30 years' imprisonment against each of his two reputed murderers—Cesare Pazzaglia and Lunigi Ceccaroni. The Fidenzi family were found guilty of abetting and shielding the assassins, and while Domenico Fidenzi's aged wife was given the mild sentence of one year and eight months' imprisonment he himself, his son Angelo and his daughter Menichella, were each condemned to five years and ten months.

**GOT EVEN WITH BARBER.**

DUBLIN, Aug. 19 (Special)—An amusing scene in a hairdresser's shop at Whitehead, Co. Antrim, was described this week at the local petty sessions, when a young man named Nelson was returned for trial on a charge of malicious damage. According to the evidence, Nelson went into the shop on Wednesday evening for the purpose of having his hair cut. He was told by the proprietor that he was too late, whereupon he seized the proprietor, who was at the door, dragged him into the shop, beat him over the counter, and bit him on the arm. The proprietor managed to get free, and ran to the police barracks for assistance, and in his absence Nelson proceeded to smash everything within his reach, including several valuable plate-glass mirrors, three windows, a large number of bottles containing toilet requisites, and a quantity of china, the damage done being estimated at \$200.

**ESCAPED FROM BANDITS.**

MILAN, Aug. 20 (Special)—A stage coach, conveying a dozen passengers from Conesano to the renowned country fair at Campo Felice near Palermo, was suddenly surrounded in a lonely part of the road by highwaymen, heavily armed with pistols and daggers.

Among the passengers was a brigadier of carabinieri named Niceto, who was on leave for the purpose of visiting his aged father, who lay dying. While the other tourists were commanded to descend and prostrate themselves with their faces to the ground, Niceto was shot through the breast. He, however, managed to leap on one of the frightened horses as it scampered away, but a few minutes later he fell dead.

**FRENCH HARD PRESSED**

PARIS, Aug. 19—Considerable anxiety is evident in military circles here over the situation in Morocco, where the French troops for the moment are practically solely on the defensive, pending the arrival of reinforcements, which are leaving Toulon and Marseilles daily.

The abandonment of Marakesh on August 16 by General Lyautey, the French Resident Governor of Morocco, was the first note indicating that serious complications were hampering the French operations. This was followed quickly by news that the pretender, El Hiba, was approaching the abandoned city, which is the religious capital of the country, and that he threatened to proclaim himself Sultan there.

**CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP**

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking the advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of postage, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department proper, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non subscribers. Seldom ever does the sender state whether or not he wishes to pay for same or of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once, there being a greater discount for cash with order than for advertising. The same applies for regular business. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items etc., of a money making nature, even though they be somewhat of a news nature, are chargeable. For instance, the advance notice or notices of a concert, lecture, pie social, picnic, etc., chargeable if an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pie or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even tho a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Verses accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but once in either morning Daily or Rural Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news.

The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided.
