SUDDEN DEATH OF REV. ROBERT LAING

HALIFAX, April 21.—The Rev. Robert Laing, founder and late principal of the Halifax Ladies' College, and one of the leading educationists of the Maritime Provinces, died very suddenly at his home here on Saturday afternoon. The late Mr. Laing was widely known in Halifax where he had lived for the past forty years. He is survived by his wife, Katharine, a daughter of the late James Croil, of Montreal, two sons, Stuart of the Artillery, who is expected to return from overseas in the immediate future, Allan, late of the 10th Siege Battery, now in Chicago, and one daughter, Jessie, in New Hampshire.

The late Robert Laing was born in 1841 in Aberdeenshire, Scotland. He left Scotland in 1847 and settled at Chambly and Buckingham, in the Province of Quebec. He was educated at McGill University and later studied theology at Morrin College, Quebec, and Edinburgh University, where he received his M. A. degree. He was ordained in 1873 and before coming to Halifax as minister of St. Matthew's Church was assistant at St. Paul's Church, Montreal.

Spending the earlier years of his life in Quebec, he always maintained a deep interest in the people of that Province and used frequently to visit his friends among them.

He succeeded the late Rev. Dr. George M. Grant in St. Matthew's pulpit and was followed, on his retirement after twelve years of strenuous work, by the Rev. Thomas Fowler.

From 1890 until a few weeks ago when age forced him to give up the principalship, the Ladies' College flourished under the firm yet gentle rule of "Daddy" Laing, as he was familiarly and affectionately called by his students, and hundreds of young Canadian women received their education at the institution.

TORONTO MARKETS

Market comments for week ending April 17th, 1919. Live Stock.

TORONTO (Union Stock Yards).—Cattle trading was very slow during the week, and prices received a setback ranging from 50 cents to \$1.00 per hundred. Receipts were twenty five hundred head less than those of a week ago and although buying was very slow at the decline, most of the stock was moved to the scales before the close of the week. The weakness on the American markets together with the proximity of the Jewish and Easter holidays, was responsible for the decline in price. No choice heavy cattle were on sale and quotations for the majority of the weights offered had a range of 14.50 to 15.00 per hundred. Of steers weighing from ten to twelve hundred pounds, a few head averaging eleven hundred and fifty pounds sold at \$15.00 per hundred, which was the top of the market for that class of stock.

The lamb and sheep market were unchanged, although there was a strong undertone to trading all week. Choice yearlings sold as high as \$22.00 per hundred, choice light sheep up to \$15.00, while spring lambs met a good inquiry at a range of \$5.00 to \$15.00 each.

The hog market advanced another 25 cents during the week. Hog prices are now the highest in the history of the Toronto trade.

Sales were made at \$20.50 f.o.b., which is equal to \$21.50, fed and watered.

MONTREAL.—Owing to heavy purchases on the part of the packers during the previous week, and also to the closeness of the Easter season, all classes of killing cattle were practically ignored by the packing houses, and as a consequence, a large number of cattle remained unsold after a week of listless trading. While the market was off about 75 cents per hundred on cattle of butcher quality, prices do not wholly indicate that reduction. Cattle of finished quality however, could not be moved.

at values higher than those prevailing last week for cattle of only fair quality. There were a few loads of very good cattle offered and of these, one load consisting of twenty five head was weighed up at \$15.75 per hundred. Nine head averaging nine hundred and seventy five pounds sold at \$14.50, and eight head averaging a little better than nine hundred and eighty sold at a similar figure.

Hardly enough sheep and lambs were offered to make a market and most of the sheep received were of breeding quality and on through billing to points in Ontario. The market was quoted as steady to strong with lambs selling from \$12.00 to \$15.00 per head, and sheep from \$11.00 to \$13.00 per hundred.

About twenty one hundred hogs were on the two markets, a slight increase over the offerings during the previous week. Despite the bearish tone of the market at the previous close, trading was strong and prices a shade higher during the week. Selects sold generally from \$21.00 to \$21.25 per hundred, off car weights, while quite a few sales were made at \$21.50. Demand was keen and the market closed very firm.

SYRACUSE TEN THOUSAND.

SYRACUSE, N.Y., April 16.—The announcement of the fifteenth renewal of the Empire State \$10,000 Purse for 212 trotters at the Grand Circuit meeting which will be held at Syracuse, Sept. 8 to 12, in connection with the New York State Fair recalls the splendid contests which have been seen in this event since W. J. Andrews won the first one with Ethel's Pride in 1905. In that race Geers finished second with Turley, while he also won it with Highball in 1907 and St. Frisco in 1916, when he defeated Mabel Trask in 2.03 1/4, the record for the race. Murphy has been more fortunate in the Empire State Purse than any other driver, as he won it with Charley Mitchell, Peter Scott and Royal Mac, while last year he finished second to Prince Lorse with Anto Guy. Of the other winners racegoers will recall Allie Jay, Spanish Queen, and Billy Burke, which J. Howard Ford afterwards sold for export to Russia. Baden included this race in his list of victories in 1912 and he was followed by Lord Dewey and Margaret Druen. The Empire State Purse at Syracuse and the Charter Oak Purse at Hartford are the only \$10,000 events for aged horses announced in 1919. Both of them will bring out the best horses in training and also result in two of the best races of the year. This race is but one of the seven early closing events on the Syracuse program, the others being a 2.06 trot for \$3,000, a 2.10 pace for \$3,000, a 2.06 pace for \$2,000, as well as a 2.18 trot and a two and three year old race to each of which \$750 is added. Arrangements have also been made to trot the Matron Stake at Syracuse this year. Its value is estimated at \$7,500.

The lure of the proverbial pot of gold at the end of the rainbow, which according to J. P. Sanden comes down in Ohio, draws every racing stable of note to the state some time during the racing season and that the horses are at when started is shown by the fact that of the nine hundred and ninety-six trotters in the 2.10 list, two hundred and twenty-seven of them made their records on Ohio tracks, while eighty-seven of the two hundred and eight pacers, in the 2.05 list also secured their tabs over the same courses. These records also gives the Ohio

tracks a long list of championship performances on the world's honor roll, the most brilliant credited to the trotters being Hamburg Belle's two mile, in 2.01 1/4, 2.01 3/4, at North Randall in 1909, Mabel Trask's three heats in 2.02 1/4, 2.02 1/4, 2.03 1/4, at Columbus in 1917, the three heats in the Lee-Axworthy Peter Volo match in 1915 when Peter Volo won the first heat in 2.02 the four year old record, and his rival added the next two in 2.03 1/4, 2.04 1/4, as well as the six heat race record which Esperanza, Blanche Carter and Bertha McGuire made at Toledo last year. In this field, the pacers flew over the two minute line, the only three heat race blow that limit being paced at Toledo last year by Miss Harris M. and Single G., their time being 1.58 1/4, 1.59 1/4, 1.59 1/4, while Directum I. defeated William at Columbus in 1914 in 1.58, 2.00, and the three year old filly Anna Bradford won at the same meeting in 2.00 1/4. The first mile below two minutes to harness also stands to the credit of the kite track at Chillicothe, where in 1894 Flying Jib with running mate paced in 1.58 1/4.

ITALIANS MAKE SERIOUS THREATS

NEW YORK, April 20.—The Associated Press tonight issues the following review of the international situation:

The situation surrounding Italy's claims before the peace conference for rights along the Adriatic seaboard has reached an acute phase. The Council of Four Sunday again listened to arguments by Premier Orlando and Foreign Minister Sonnino, who endeavored to straighten out the tangle but their efforts seemingly went for naught so far as a give and take method of setting the controversy is concerned.

President Wilson did not take part in the session of the Council, and it is asserted that Monday, when a further effort will be made to surmount the obstacles which are hindering an agreement, he likewise will be absent.

Italians to Leave For Home.

The Italian statesmen will depart for Rome Monday and wish to place before Parliament the result of their work in Paris.

Italy, it is asserted, is still desirous of obtaining the entire Dalmatian coast and adjacent islands and also the city of Fiume, without sharing the territory with the Jugoslavs. The Italian army is declared to be behind the Italian Premier in obtaining complete fulfillment of Italy's aspirations. The threat is said to have been held out in a despatch to the Premier from the heads of the Italian army that in case Italy's desires are not acquiesced in, Italy, without reference to the conference, would occupy the regions to which she considers herself entitled.

No Alliance for U. S.

The talk of the formation of an alliance to protect France from further aggressions by Germany has brought forth the statement from a high source in the American peace delegation that the United States will enter into no alliance which would be inconsistent with the spirit of the League of Nations. President Wilson conferred with Premier Clemenceau Sunday afternoon, but the nature of their talk was not disclosed.

Chaotic conditions still prevail at Munich, where the Government troops are declared to have been augmented and a battle for supremacy seems to be in immediate prospect.

Spontaneous fighting is reported to be in progress in the Bavarian capital. The Soldiers' Council at Vienna has taken over the Austrian capital and purposes to administer it with a Bolshevik government. Troops representing the Soldiers' Council have occupied the parliament buildings. No trouble in the city is anticipated. The Allied representative has issued a proclamation declaring that if there are disorders the food supply will be cut off. Representatives with plenipotentiary powers are to be demanded of Germany at Versailles when the peace treaty is handed to Germany. The Council of Four has informed Germany that representatives who are merely messengers cannot be recognized.
