U.S. Budget Fails To Mt'l. Stock Exchange

(By Frank MacMillan, Associated Press Financial Writer) (A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Jan. 7.—Faced with the details of the United States budget totalling more than \$8,000,000,000 for the forthcoming fiscal year, financial markets today were neither disconcerted nor especially buoyant.

Steel and rail stocks pushed upward sedately, a number of specialties exhibited a fair amount of strength and the utilities and motors were inclined to yield some ground. But all in all the equities list performed about as usual with the only difference being that there was a little more activity than in recent sessions.

The huge borrowing programme of the government might have been expected to unsettle U. S. government securities, but after some early nervousness, federal issues steadied perceptibly and the majority ended in somewhat higher territory.

Steel Issues Advance On Montreal Exchange

By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Jan. 7.—In the face of reports that steel production had shown a vast increase during the past year and that demand was at the highest point it had reached for some time, steel issues on the Montreal Stock Exchange moved sharply higher in heavy trading today.

The advance in the steel stocks had its effect on the rest of the market and narrow gains were generally in evidence with a high degree of optimism prevailing. Dealings were carried on at an active and cheery pace during the middle part of the day but slackened off towards the close.
