..MEETING OF GEORGETOWN TOWN COUNCIL.—The monthly meeting of the Town Council of Georgetown was held in the Council Chamber at 7 o'clock on Monday evening, July 2nd inst. His Worship Mayor Knight in the chair. Councillors Solomon, Macdonald, Skinner, Ross and Jenkins and Town Clerk Lavers were present. After the minutes of the last meeting had been read and adopted, Councillor Macdonald, delegate to the meeting of Mayors recently held in Charlottetown, gave a detailed and interesting report of the proceedings thereof, which report upon motion was unanimously adopted. Several bills for work done were then read by the Clerk, the majority of which were ordered to be laid over for further consideration. A discussion then ensued regarding the Police Committee wait upon that official concerning the performance of his duties. The salary of the policemen \$125 per annum. Councillor Macdonald then presented a request from the Exhibition Association, asking that the rent of the Drill Shed for Exhibition purposes be reduced. On motion it was unanimously agreed that the rent be reduced from the old rate of \$40 to \$25 during the time the buildings is in use for Exhibition purposes. The matter of providing a new flag for the Town Hall, and attending to the shutters on the Drill Shed was discussed. Several other matters, such as the repair of concrete pumps, obtaining gravel for concrete work, etc., were also under discussion, after which the meeting adjourned.—&
