Death Yesterday of Mr. P. W. Clarkin



The unexpected death of Mr. P. W. Clarkin, well known Charlottetown citizen, occurred in the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday morning where he had entered for treatment only last Saturday morning. He was in his 74th year.

Though not in the best of health since his return in March from California where he had spent the winter months, Mr. Clarkin's death came as a complete shock to the many friends and acquaintances he had made during his 47 years' service with the Canadian National Railways.

Stressing the immediate necessity of a mastitis control programme by Prince Edward Island dairymen, Dr. George Bishop, Department of Agriculture Veterinary service, read a very comprehensive paper on the subject before the semi-annual meeting of the Milk Vendors and Producers Association last evening at Birch Court, Mr. Smith MacFarlane presiding.

Dr. Bishop described in detail the symptoms and diagnosis of the disease, its causes, control and treatment. He stressed the necessity of testing and properly segregating and treating infected animals.

Sask. Has Surplus With Debt Reduction

REGINA, May 10 (CP)—Provincial Treasurer C. M. Fines announced today that Saskatchewan's surplus for the fiscal year ending March 31, 1949, amounted to \$1,014,000. Total revenue for the year was \$55,628,000 with expenditures of \$54,600,000. He said the net debt was reduced \$4,201,742 to \$148,091,187 placing Saskatchewan fourth among the provinces in respect to lowest debt.
