RE STAMP TAX.—The following was received by F. J. Casey, Collector of Inland Revenue on July 2nd:—"Amendments to Special War Revenue Act assented to. Stamp tax on promissory notes, bills of exchange, bank overdrafts and stock transfers, therefore, effective from 1st instant." This applies to the amendments to the Special War Revenue Act, 1915, introduced in the House of Commons, May 19th and June 17th, and now applies to the stamp tax on promissory notes, bills of exchange, bank overdrafts and stock transfers. The amendment which is in force from July 1st is as follows: "That a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on promissory notes, bills of exchange and advances made by a bank by way of overdraft of the value of one hundred dollars or less, and that a tax of two cents additional be imposed on every one hundred dollars or fractional part thereof in excess of one hundred dollars." "That a stamp tax of two cents be imposed, levied and collected on each \$100 of face value or fraction thereof of stock transferred."

The Old Gardener Few amateurs realize how easy it is to make many plants out of one, and thus increase their supply. The secret is division of the root growth. Take the old-fashioned bleeding heart, for example. As soon as it stops flowering you can dig up a big plant and cut off the fleshy roots within three inches or so of the crown. Enough root will be left so that the plant will go on growing when you set it back in the ground. Divide the severed roots into pieces about three inches long and plant them in a well prepared large enough plants so ed bed, three inches apart. By next spring they will that you can set them in their permanent beds and get a wealth of flowers. It's an economical short cut.
