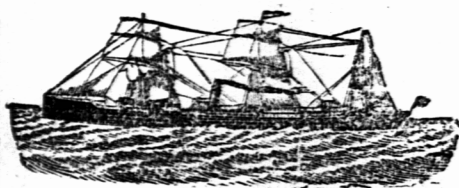

CAPT. J.

HUGHES

Charged With Violation Prohibition Law

BEFORE THE COURT

Attorney General for Prosecution and W. S. Stewart for Defence.

At the police court yesterday morning Capt. John Hughes appeared charged with violating the Act Prohibiting the Sale of Intoxicating Liquor. The case being the first under the new Act was therefore of the greatest interest, in view of which fact the evidence taken is subjoined. Attorney General Peters appeared for the prosecution and Mr. W. S. Stewart, Q. C. for the defendant. Four subpoenas were issued, three of which were served. The fourth on Pius McEachern, was not served owing to his removal to Cape Breton. Officers Doyle and Carter testified to having visited the home of the witness and finding the door locked. They were told by Pius McDonald that McEachern was away from home.

Dugald McIsaac, was the first witness called. He testified as to his acquaintance with John Hughes. The defendant keeps a tavern on Water Street. He believed he was in his saloon on June 5th, and got some beer. He could hardly tell what kind of beer it was. It was not intoxicating. It did not take a "chip" out of him. He did not remember how many glasses he took. The beer was pumped out with the pump by Mr. Hughes. He might have paid for some himself. He did not remember who called for the beer. He only knew one witness in the saloon at the time. In reply to Mr. Peters' question, witness stated that he could have taken all the beer in the barrel without getting drunk, that is if his stomach would hold it. He did not know what action the beer would have on others. He would not like to say he could not take four or five glasses of whiskey without getting drunk.

Kenneth Ferguson, (sworn.) He knew John Hughes. He was in the saloon on the 5th of June. It was after his supper. He did not take any stock of who was in at the time. He did not know how many glasses he had. He paid for his own. In his opinion it was

not the same beer as sold before the Act came into force. He would not swear whether the beer was intoxicating or not. It had no effect upon him because he had whiskey previous.

Mr. Peters—Where did you get the whiskey?

Mr. Stewart objected and submitted that only evidence bearing upon the case before the court could be heard.

The Attorney-General contended that it was important that witness should tell who gave him the whiskey. He makes an excuse and gives the drinking of whiskey as a reason why he cannot tell the kind of beer sold him by Hughes.

His Honor ruled that all evidence throwing light upon the case would be admitted. He considered, however, the question asked by the attorney-General was not a regular one and did not bear upon the case.

Michael Hennessey, (sworn) He was in Hughes' saloon on the day the Act came into force. He called for a glass of temperate beer and paid for it.

Mr. Peters—Why did you ask for temperate beer?

Witness—That was the kind of beer he asked for lately. He had only one glass and there was no one there that he knew. He was not in the habit of drinking whiskey. He had not taken whiskey for two months. John Hughes served the beer charging him 5 cents for the glass.

Upon the application of Attorney-General Peters the case was adjourned for one week. The adjournment was made owing to the absence of Pius McEachern

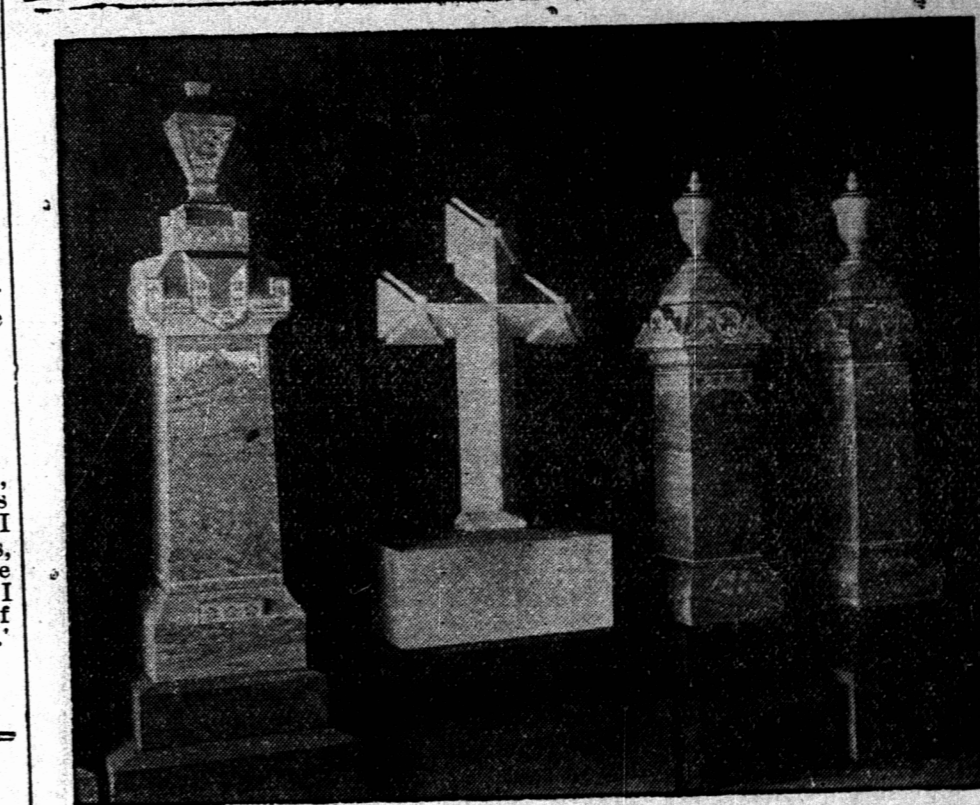
