Citizens were shocked Friday morning to learn of the death of Mrs. John F. Duffy who died very suddenly from heart failure, shortly after 11 o'clock the previous night.

Mrs. Duffy, who was apparently in excellent health, complained early in the evening of a slight fluttering in the region of the heart, but thought nothing of it and spent the evening as usual in the midst of her family of whom she was the tender and beloved centre.

On retiring to her room she decided to go into the kitchen again for some soda, and while in the act of getting it, was stricken and without a word dropped to the floor, expiring before loving hands could reach her.

ABEGWEITS AND SAINTS AGAIN PLAY DRAWN TILT

Both Teams Score Unconverted Trys in First Half, to Play a Rugged Zero Last Stanza, score 3-3.

The Abegweits by no means the favorite in Saturday's game with Saint Dunstan's, upset all previous dope as to their ability by holding the Collegians to another drawn game, the score standing 3 all at the final whistle.

Notwithstanding a wet and slippery gridiron the game as a whole had many bright spots with fast and scintillating plays in both halves.

The red and white squad was the first to score when Tingley on a fast exhibition of running followed a long punt by Hagen, the oval crossing the Abbie dead line to be pounced on by the former. The try was unconverted. The count was registered in exactly twenty minutes of playing time.

The Abegweits not to be outdone quickly forced the play into Saints' territory to even up a half minute before the whistle. The try was a heady piece of work. After making four unsuccessful attempts on the Collegians' five yard line, Loneragan carrying on each occasion, the play was shifted in a twinkling to Kelly who received the fifth pass to "buck" the scrum and score in a maze of struggling bodies. The try was also unconverted.

The last half was perhaps the better football, with the red and white forcing the issue to gain a slight edge in territory. The red and white warriors, however, playing a close defensive game when in danger turned the locals back at every turn.

Only a "corporal's guard" by way of attendance showed up for Saturday's tussle—merely anything but encouraging for football. It is hoped that a bumper crowd will be on hand at the next game between the teams. It is expected that the Saints and Abies will again clash on Thursday afternoon.

As yet the championship is still undecided, the series calling for the best two games out of three. The Collegians won one game to play to a tie in the others; a second win therefore is necessary to claim the title.

The Game by Halves

The Abbies kick off to lose the advantage in a twinkling when the University squad start a parade by way of dribble lane and advance to their opponents ten yard line before being halted. A score looked bright on the horizon when they gained five more yards, but it turning the ball over to the Abies on a well directed kick, the oval going into touch on the 25 yard line. The play, however, is soon back in the Abbie danger zone with the Saints working like Trojans for a score and nearly realized, but for McNutt who carried over his own line to touch for safety. On the heel out from a ten yard scrum the red and black carry and dribble the play to centre field, where O'Brien, flaming tattered red and white, flung the ball over the top to kick the ball over to Abbie line for a second safety touch. The Collegians are equal to the emergency; on the lineout the Fleming and Hagen trio get going to march the thirty-five yards where Mark Dunphy loses an opportunity on a numble. 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Second Half

This half found the Abegweits carrying the play, for the most part to their opponents who worked a local onslaught, and try as they may there was the red and white University line.
