May Announce Visit To United States: LONDON, Nov. 7 (CP) - Rumors were current in London tonight that the King may announce during his speech from the Throne opening Parliament tomorrow that he and the Queen will visit the United States next summer. Official circles declined to discuss the rumor's which were to the effect the King might announce acceptance of an invitation from President Roosevelt to go to the United States at the time of their Majesty's journey to Canada.
