YANKS LAND IN FORCE ON LUZON IS.

Island Delegation Has Conference With Prime Minister King

OTTAWA, Jan. 9 — (CP) — Premier J. Walter Jones of Prince Edward Island and a delegation from his government conferred with Prime Minister Mackenzie King and members of the Federal Government on their transportation problems today.

Premier Jones and his group, concerned about the ferry service between the island and the mainland, had a preliminary meeting with Transport Minister Michaud and later visited the Prime Minister's office where they were received by Mr. King, Finance Minister Fliley, Mr. Michaud and Justice Minister St. Laurent.

Registration For Family Allowances To Begin In P. E. I.

OTTAWA, Jan. 9 — (CP) — Registration for benefits under the family allowance bill will begin in Prince Edward Island in advance of other provinces, Health Minister Clouston said today during an address to the Canadian Club.

Mr. Clouston told his audience, which included Prime Minister Mackenzie King and Premier J. Walter Jones of Prince Edward Island, that Canada's smallest province had been selected for the start of registration to provide experience which could be used during registration in the larger provinces.

U-Boat Warfare Flared Again During December

LONDON, Jan. 9 — (CP) — U-boat warfare "flared into renewed activity" during December, it was reported tonight in a statement which described the increased activity by German submarines as "the most serious since the war began."

The Allies continue to sink the enemy's U-boats in widely separated parts of the world, the monthly joint statement of Prime Minister Churchill and President Roosevelt said.

The announcement of the recent sinking of a U-boat on the Maine coast is yet another indication that the menace of Germany's undersea fleet is real and continuing.

Seek Salary Increases

SAINT JOHN, N.B., Jan. 9 — (CP) — Fifteen-dollar-a-month increases in wages and salaries of civic employees were requested by the employees in a petition read today at a city council meeting.

The matter was referred to the committee on budgets. Members of the Fire and Police Departments in a separate statement were not included in the petition.

Strike Ties Up Transport In 3 B. C. Cities

Labor Minister Mitchell Calls For Strikers To Return To Work

VANCOUVER, Jan. 9 — (CP) — Citizens of three Pacific coast cities — Vancouver, Victoria and New Westminster — used shanks mare, rode bicycles, taxis, hitchhiked to and from work today after 2700 street railwaymen and bus drivers went on strike for increased wages and improved working conditions.

Weather conditions were warm and dry and no tieup of business and industry was reported. Ninety per cent of workers in essential industries and services were estimated to be at work in the three centres.

PARIS, Jan. 9 — (CP Cable) — John Bracken today expressed himself as "greatly impressed" by arrangements in Paris for the reception and entertainment of Canadian troops back on leave from the fighting fronts.

The former Manitoba Premier who now is National Leader of the Progressive Conservative Party spent the afternoon touring hotels, rest centres and clubs maintained for troops. He spent the evening with Maj.-Gen. Georges F. Vanier, Canadian Ambassador.

F. D. R. Presents New Budget To U. S. Congress

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9 — (CP) — A budget which contemplates the necessity of waging war for at least another 18 months was presented to Congress today by President Roosevelt, who asked for \$70,000,000,000 for war purposes and \$13,000,000,000 for civil government.

These appropriations are for the fiscal year which ends June 30, 1946, and are about \$17,000,000,000 short of the \$100,000,000,000 estimated needs for the current fiscal year in the last budget.

A true bill in the case of Florence Elizabeth McNeill, Charlottetown, charged with the murder of her husband William (Ryan) McNeill, was found by the Grand Jury yesterday at the opening sitting of the January Term of the Supreme Court.

Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presided. G. R. Holmes represented the Attorney-General.

The Grand Jury brought in a true bill against Josiah Smith on an indictment of assault occasioning actual bodily harm.

Enemy Still Pulling Out Of Tip Of Belgium Salient

PARIS, Jan. 9 — (CP) — British 2nd Army forces hammering against the western nose of the German salient driving into Belgium today met weak opposition for the second straight day, the Germans withdrawing nearly a mile south of the Hottot-Marche sector. British infantry took the village of Cheux, five miles east of Namur, and cleared the entire Naumont Forest nearby.

Meanwhile United States infantry and tanks drove through a fierce blizzard to within less than three miles of the Germans' last main supply and escape highway in the salient and tonight Field Marshal Von Rundstedt was reported hurriedly shutting armor forces from the Bastogne area to meet the threat to the vital road.

HALIFAX, Jan. 9 — (CP) — Eager for their homecoming after facing the enemy on land, sea and air, about 500 Canadian servicemen disembarked today from the British Hospital Ship Landoverly Castle, and most of them started for home tonight aboard hospital trains.

Local Man Rescued In Icy Strait

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 9 — (CP) — Eben MacLeod of Charlottetown, travelling to Halifax on the Northumberland Strait Car ferry, fell into the icy Strait today but was rescued by a boat's crew 15 minutes later.

MacLeod was in a weakened condition when pulled into the rescue boat. He was revived aboard the ferry.

Butter Stocks In Further Decline

OTTAWA, Jan. 9 — (CP) — A decline of nearly 4,000,000 pounds in creamery butter production in December as compared with November, was reported today by the Butter Board, which said that butter ration of about six ounces a person weekly, it was learned today. The Prices Board announced a reduction in the ration from seven ounces to about six in December "to make consumption meet supplies" during the winter months of low production.

C. F. members from a former declaration not to nominate Labor-Progressive candidates in these constituencies.

McNaughton, is the latest of a series of statements and actions which attest to the determination of the C. C. F. to continue its reckless partisan tactics," said the statement.
