**SEES RISE IN SUGAR; BLAMES PRESIDENT.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—Failure of the President to authorize the purchase of the Cuban sugar crop for 1920 makes it virtually certain that sugar prices will increase after next Jan. 1, a Senate sub-committee, was told by George A. Zabriskie, president of the Sugar Equalization Board and Judge W. A. Glasgow, counsel for the Food Administration.

The President has been advised that the "situation is out of hand," they said and refiners notified that control of the market probably would end after Dec. 31.

**DER GOLTZ ARMY TRAVELLING BACK TO GERMANY**

BERLIN, October 8.—The greater portion of the German troops under General Von Der Goltz, whose recall from the Baltic provinces was demanded by the Allies and ordered by the German government, are now on their way back to Germany, according to semi-official information received by the Tagblatt. The advices declare, however, that the German are badly hampered in their movements by the enmity of the Estonians and the Letts, who are putting obstructions in the way of their progress along the eighty kilometre stretch between Mitau and Shavil, where on opportunity offers itself to waylay the Germans.

As the winter season approaches, the flaring skirt that is wired or otherwise reinforced so that it flares smartly about the figure is increasingly in evidence. This silhouette, of course, is confined to frocks for afternoon or evening wear. Street apparel adheres to the straight line. Evening gowns are riots of color.

The sketch illustrates a frock having a straight skirt, flared over wiring. It may be made of a soft taffeta and trimmed with bands of satin or taffeta in contrasting shade and with applied velvet flowers, giving an additional trimming touch, or the frock may be of chiffon or Georgette, with bands of silver, ribbon and collar and sleeves frills of silver lace.

One of the late novelties is the frock of soft panne velvet duvetyen, or similar fabric, having a fitted bodice and skirt that is five to seven yards in width. This type of skirt, of course, is not reinforced and hangs in rather straight lines, but the width is there.

**NEW CANADIAN FLYING CLUB**  
TORONTO, Oct. 8.—For the encouragement of returned aviators, 80 fliers, including some of the most distinguished in the Canadian or British service, have formed themselves into an association to be known as the Canadian Flying Club. The organization will do all in its power to keep the returned men in touch with civilian flying so that they may not lose the benefit of their excellent military training, and in this way constitute a national air force reserve. The club hopes to maintain an aerodrome, where machines will be available for the use of all Canadian fliers, who in proportion to the population number one to every thousand, thus giving the Dominion the premier place in the aeronautical world. A committee of 16 was elected to draw up a constitution.
