Hour has Come
 The hour has come when we are to be put to the test, as the innocent people of Holland and Belgium are being put to the test already.

You and I must rally behind our new leader and with unshakable courage fight and work until this wild beast that has sprung out of his lair upon us has been finally disarmed and overthrown.

Duty was Plain
 Under these circumstances my duty was plain. I sought an audience with the King and tendered him my resignation on which His Majesty was pleased to accept. His Majesty has now entrusted to my friend and colleague Mr. Winston Churchill the task of forming a new administration on a national basis. In this task I have no doubt that he will be successful.

For this purpose my other colleagues in the government had nominated to him that they will place their resignation in Mr. Churchill's hands; but they will, of course, retain their present offices pending the appointment of a new government.

I should perhaps say that Mr. Churchill has expressed to me his strong desire that I should be a member of his cabinet, and I have told him I will gladly give him all the assistance I can in that capacity.

Last Message from No. 10.
 This is my last message to you from No. 10. There are one or two things I would like to say to you during the period—almost exactly five years—I have been Prime Minister. I have borne a heavy load of anxiety and responsibility. As long as I believed there was any chance of preserving peace honourably, I strove to take it. When that hope vanished and war had become equally hard to wage it with all my might.

Fighting Evil Things
 Perhaps you will remember that on my broadcast on Sept. 3 last I said that we should be fighting against evil things. My words have proved to be sufficient to describe the vilest of things who have now stalked every-where on the great battle which is

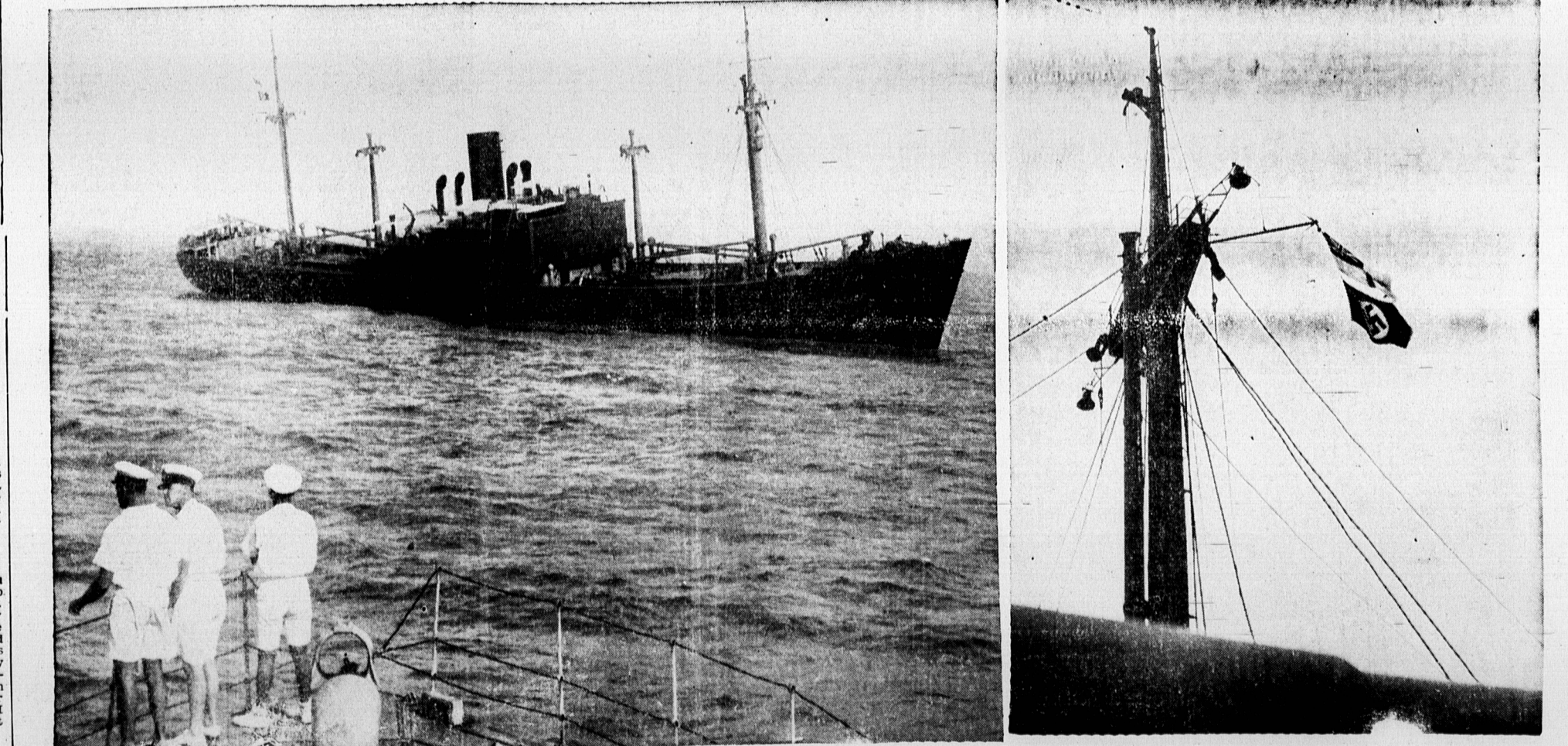

 DUNDEE—Clifton of the distinguished Flying Cross for Officer Andrew Hood of this Scottish city came after he had been reported missing in action.

 HAVANA, Cuba—Norman Sommerville, K.C., of Toronto will be chairman of the Council of Legislation, International Rotary convention here, June 9-14, 1940.



Capture of a German Merchant ship by the new Canadian flotilla leader H.M.C.S. Assiniboine and a British cruiser has won high praise for the Canadian commander and crew. Overhauled in the Caribbean sea in the darkness of early morning, the German crew set their ship afire and tried to flee. The Canadians helped battle the blaze and tow the vessel through heavy seas to Kingston, Jamaica, as a prize of war. These pictures, taken from the Assiniboine, show the Hannover as she lay helpless with steering gear disabled. At right the British ensign surmounts the swastika on the captured ship. As the ensign went up, the German captain watched glumly from the bridge, under a British seaman's bayonet.

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
