Considerable ice was reported between Point Prim and the Blockhouse but it did not interfere greatly with the progress of the steamer.

RUSTICO NOTES—The farmers in this section have taken advantage of the good roads during the past few weeks.—John H. DeRoche in the employ of Weeks & Co., has returned to Charlottetown, after spending a few days at his home.

The members of the Rustico Brass Band are progressing rapidly under the teaching of Jeremiah Doucette.—Miss Fannie Gallant, Rustico, is spending a few weeks in Charlottetown with her many friends.—Miss Angle Peters has returned home having enjoyed a short visit to her friends, Miss Bertie Reagh.—Miss Josie Gallant, Rustico, who attended the funeral of her uncle, Charles Gallant, in Pictou, has gone to Halifax with her aunt to spend some time there. She is expected home soon.

Conditions seem to have changed. A Frederictonian who has a contract on P. E. Island is actually purchasing in New Brunswick thirty horses and taking them over for the work. As the Island has been supplying the mainland and the continent and elsewhere with horses, the purchase is attracting considerable attention. The contractor gives as a reason that the price of horses on the Island is higher than on the mainland, and that it is cheaper to purchase horses in New Brunswick, and take them to the Island than to purchase them on the Island and use them there. He also says that the horses which have worked in New Brunswick in the woods during the winter, are better fed and harder than those fed and employed on the Island. What have the Island people to say about this?—Moncton Transcript.
