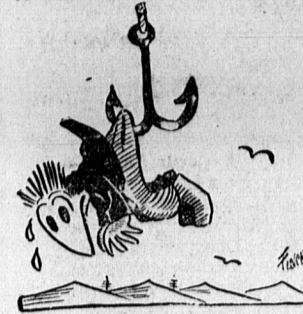

## SUBSTANTIAL GAIN IN EXPORTS OF DOMINION

OTTAWA, Nov. 2.—The trade statement of the Trade and Commerce Department for the twelve months ending Aug. 31 shows that the total trade of Canada was \$1,063,908,233. The exports had grown from 413,000,000 to 488,000,000, while the imports fell from 686 to 544 millions, the principal increase in exports were: Animal produce from 43 to 61 millions; agricultural products from 159 to 183 million; manufactures from 48 to 63 millions. Imports from the West Indies increased from \$4,127,000 to \$5,598,000, while exports to West Indies increased from \$4,388,000 to 35,075,000. Imports from the United Kingdom fell from 145 to 114 millions, but exports to the United Kingdom grew from 189 to 218 millions. Imports from the United States fell from 448 to 373 millions, while exports to the United States increased from 175 to 209 millions.

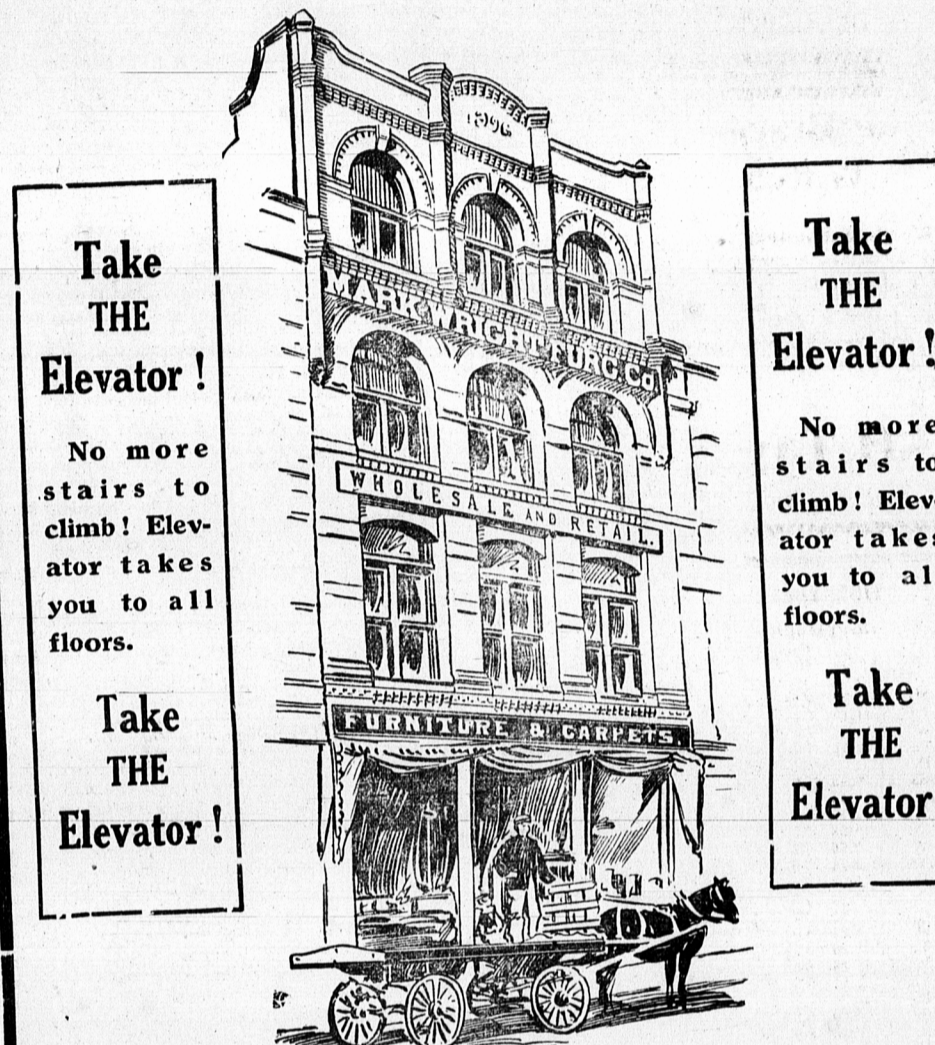
