Services in Zion Presbyterian Church

Rev. W. Scott Fulton's subject was "A Supreme Optimist" from Luke XIX, referring to Zacharias, the publican and Christ's recognition of him, notwithstanding his displaced position among the people—a tax collector for the Roman Government was looked down upon by the people, and generally deserved the hatred of the country owing to the many injustices practised on the taxpayers. Yet Jesus by this incident displayed His love for all classes—no matter how degraded the sinner is, Christ takes an interest in him and has faith in the possibility of his conversion though to men that may be regarded as unwarrantable, but Christ is the Supreme Optimist and welcomes the return of all men to Him when genuine repentance is shown.

The Anthem by the Choir was as usual a very pleasing and inspiring part of the service.
The Bible Class in the afternoon was addressed by Miss G. L. Ruthford, B. A., Assistant National Secretary of the Students Christian Movement in Canada. The subject was most interesting and held the attention of all. Further remarks were made and thanks tendered the speaker by Mr. Alex Matheson and the Pastor.

How Faces Are Lifted
LONDON, Mar. 26.—Widows of 45 and Army officers from the rank of major upwards comprise the majority of clients of the beauty specialist, according to Charles H. Will, a self-styled "cosmetic surgeon," who described how the sagging skin of a face is "lifted up" and tightened. This is how it is done:

The hair just above the ears is shaved and the skin carefully washed. A local anaesthetic is then injected into the skin and from about each ear is cut a narrow strip of skin. The length varies from about 2 inches to 4 inches and the width about 1 1/2 inch to 1 inch. The two edges are then sewn up with fine silk thread. The time taken is about 40 minutes. There is no bleeding and the only mark left is a thin white line which can scarcely be detected.

To tighten the skin of the neck just forward of the ears a similar operation is carried out at the back of the ears.
Wide noses are made narrow by removing a little cartilage inside the nose, and saddle-back-noses with a sinking bridge—are straightened by inserting cartilage or a special hard substance. Lines from the nose to the mouth can be permanently removed in one minute by inserting under each line a special instrument a fine flexible rod or hard substance.

My patients' motives for wanting their faces improved is usually desire to be active. People with facial blemishes lose confidence. Of my clients 90 per cent. are women. In this connection Sir W. Arbuthnot Lane, the surgeon, said that women could not be blamed for going to "Beauty doctors". He said:

"Women will always want to look young and beautiful, and I have nothing but sympathy with them. It is a great pity that surgeons do not make themselves familiar with such operations and that they are content to leave the work in the hands of people who, in so many cases are not qualified."

Four Monarchists Sentenced to Death
BERLIN, Mar. 27.—Four members of the former Black Reichswehr a monarchist military organization within the army, were sentenced to death in the Berlin criminal court yesterday for the murder in 1923 of Major Walter Wilms.
Wilms was suspected by the organization of betraying its anti-republican activities to the government.
