LEFT FOR OTTAWA—Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, left yesterday for Ottawa, to attend a meeting of the Agricultural Supplies Committee, recently established by order in council to mobilize Canadian agricultural industry to facilitate maximum export of agricultural supplies to Great Britain and her Allies and to insure constructive direction of agricultural production.

RECEIVES SAD NEWS—Word was received by W. G. Darke, of Hunter River by his nephew Nesmith Wise that his brother, Fred W. Drake died suddenly of a hemorrhage of the heart on the 15th instant. He was the youngest of a family of eight. Born at Brookfield 61 years ago, he moved West before the war of 1914. **TORONTO, Sept. 25 (CP)**—Chlorine gas escaping from the filter room in the basement of Allenby public school today endangered hundreds of pupils until city firemen wearing gas masks repaired the leak. **BUCHAREST, Rumania, Sept. 25 (AP)**—An unofficial survey today showed Poland lost between 600 and 700 planes in 19 days of aerial warfare with Germany.
