WINSLOE SCHOOL EXAMINATION.

On Wednesday afternoon, Feb. the 6th, we witnessed a very interesting and successful examination conducted in the school of Winsloe South. Notwithstanding the stormy character of the weather quite a number of friends residing in the neighborhood gathered for the occasion among whom were Messrs. John Horne, Henry Horne, George Howard George Turner, Rev. J. Parkins and several ladies who were specially interested in the work of the school.

There were present forty three scholars constituting the junior and senior departments, under the tuition and management of Mr. V. Crocket and Miss Henderson.

Three juvenile classes were examined in reading, spelling and writing on a slate, who manifested very remarked and sure progress in these early steps to learning, and who reflected great credit on the patience and perseverance of the teacher in charge.

Adjourning to the senior department, we found the room well filled with scholars. The fifth reading class was called out, consisting of boys and girls who showed an intimate acquaintance with the tone and structure of the lesson taken in hand and with the spelling which ensued. The sixth reading class, which was next called out, showed the fruits of careful training, viz., in the clearness of enunciation, and in points of emphasis, as well as (in one or two cases) in a facile and fine tone of voice running rhythmically over the lines to reach the period. To a class of boys and girls in English history a few questions were put on the beginning part of the Victorian Era and were answered to the satisfaction of the friends and visitors present. Two classes were examined in elementary Latin, and one in French, in each of which subjects the scholars had evidently been well grounded and trained. In a brief grammar lesson conducted by Senior Teacher, the parsing and analysis were good. A black-board exercise in mental arithmetic, in vulgar fractions, and in the division of algebraic quantities, was interesting to us all, and reminded some of us, at least, of work done in years long since gone by. For want of time geometry and geography were left out of the program. At the close of the exercises several gentlemen present gave short addresses, expressive, in the main, of their determination to strengthen the hands of the teachers, and of their solicitude for the continued prosperity of the school.

In finishing my report of this afternoon's work, I would like to whisper in the ears of the boys, privately, and say, as my humble opinion, that the girls will go beyond them in most subjects, if they do not sharpen their wits, and move on a little more smartly to the ins and outs of their book lore.—Com.
