In the meantime, Hugo (Lyle Talbot), a trader, hears news that Jean's sled has been found floating down the river. He immediately organizes a searching party and heads north.

Hugo, accompanied by his huge dog, Buck, at last reaches the stranded couple from which point the story builds to a powerful climax. To tell further would spoil the suspense of the story.

Arlen is excellent in the role of the half-civilized trapper and both Beverly Roberts and Talbot score with outstanding performances.

The full details of his operations are not yet known, but when they are, they are liable to cause as much excitement as was caused sometime ago when Montreal detectives were brought here for the same purpose.

Dictators Will Meet Common Fate, Is Belief

"Prophecy" declared the Rev. Nell Herman in the Central Christian Church last night before a large and interested congregation, "is history written beforehand." Speaking on the theme, Fascism, Nazism and Communism, the speaker held the rapt attention of his audience throughout his discourse.

"We are face to face, not with a struggle against flesh and blood but against the principles and the rulers of darkness of the world," the speaker said. Fascism, Nazism and Communism sprang from a common stock. No one could read the fundamentals of these organized forces without recognizing they were bred and born in the dark and were developed in the mysteries of the night. Their activities were carried on under the strategy of diplomats, methods and contrivances which spring from the blackness of falsehood and deceit. "The forces which confront us tonight under the captions of Fascism, Nazism and Communism, are at the root a denial of Almighty God," Rev. Mr. Herman declared. They were arranged against God and His Christ and were a counterfeit of a religion which is rooted in the natural man whose heart surges with all the passions

of unbridled appetites. These organizations, were the spirits of demons, the speaker continued. No man who dared call himself a scientist could deny the existence of demons. "To say we know the Bible and at the same time to turn our backs upon the Biblical account of the demon is to work only to prove that the Book which we think we know is a tragic and unknown quantity."

Sir Oliver Lodge declared that any man professing to be a scientist who was examining certain forms of ev' as they exist today, would deny the existence of demons in terrible certainty was only to show himself a man void of anything called scientific.

"If we will strip our minds of prejudice we can but decide that Russia as it stands today is an economic miracle. Hitler, the former Austrian paper hanger—and there are those who call him a poor paper hanger—who can invite to his Bavarian fastness the Premier of the greatest democracy of the world is, humanly speaking, nothing short of a miracle. Mussolini, the master of none is the most colorful man in Europe. This man, who never could obtain a steady job before he became a dictator, now sits astride the universe like a colossus. At the feet of a man called Stalin 180 million men, women and children grovel, bowing to one who has turned Russia upside down and made that country a greatest example of collective industry in the history of the world. To attempt to joke with these men of power is only to invite the defeat of our democracy and to land us in the mire of a world which we can hardly hope to extricate ourselves," Mr. Herman believed.

The question has been raised what road is Hitler travelling upon? Whither leads Mussolini? And who is the final destiny of Stalin? The Book of God declares that each and all of them are travelling down the road to Armageddon. They will meet in the Valley of Megiddo. They are to meet the King of Kings and the Lord of Lords coming back to the world for which he died.

Let not the church worry over the final issue of this hour, the speaker advised. Just as sure as the sun will rise tomorrow so will the foes of Christ and His Kingdom meet their defeat, which will be brought about not by a League of Nations or a world court but by the coming of Him whose brightness shall overcome the sun, the moon and usher in the 1000 years of peace.

At last, evening's service Mr. Harry Porter rendered a violin solo which was greatly appreciated by the congregation.

Rev. Mr. Herman, who is occupying the pulpit at the Central Christian Church during the absence of the pastor Rev. S. C. Cooper, will speak again on Sunday at both morning and evening services.
