PEOPLE'S DECISION

Is Confirmed by the Presbytery.

DUNDAS EXTENDS CALL

Rev. Isaac Murray's Jubilee To be Celebrated—Expression of Sympathy.

Presbytery met at Cavendish on Tuesday June 12th to confer with the congregation regarding the site of the proposed new church. Mr. E. Smith of Kensington preached from the words, That in all things He might have the preeminence, Col 1:18.

After investigation Presbytery sanctioned the proceedings of the congregation relative to the selection of a site, confirmed the site and recommended the immediate commencement of the work of building.

Presbytery agreed to cooperate with the Cavendish congregation in celebrating the jubilee of the Rev. Isaac Murray, D.D. and appointed Rev. D. B. McLeod and Mr. T. C. James to make the necessary arrangements.

A call from the congregation of Dundas addressed to Mr. Malcolm Buchanan, licentiate was sustained and ordered to be forwarded to Mr. Buchanan. The call was signed by 268 persons and accompanied by a guarantee of \$575.00 per annum. Presbytery agreed to ask a grant of \$175.00 from the augmentation committee.

Provisional arrangements for Mr. Buchanan's induction were made as follows:—Time and place to be determined by the Moderator and Clerk upon receipt of Mr. Buchanan's reply. Mr. D. B. McLeod to preside, Mr. A. J. McNeill to preach, Mr. W. H. Spencer to address the minister and Mr. A. W. K. Herdman the people.

The following resolution was placed on the minutes and a copy ordered to be forwarded to Mr. Gunn:

"Presbytery learns with regret of the illness of Mr. Adam Gunn, extends to him sincerest sympathy in his suffering, prays that his health may be speedily and permanently restored and commends his congregation to the care of the neighbouring ministers while thus deprived of pastoral oversight."

Presbytery adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and Clerk.

BEEF MAKES SAVAGES.

The effect of environment upon animals and plants has been a recognized fact for many years, but the influence of food upon all members of the animal kingdom, including man, is not so well attested. Some years ago a reverend naturalist, bearing this fact in mind, decided to make some experiments on fishes and other creatures; he fed about a dozen kinds of fish on a diet into which pepper entered to a large extent, and was much gratified when he found that the skins of his patients changed color. Other similar experiments in dieting were attended with like results, and the naturalist soon came to the conclusion that food must have a marked effect upon the character and physical condition of the individual.

This gentleman, confident of the result, did not think it necessary to make experiments on man, and consequently, says Pearson's Weekly, was not able to profound any satisfactory theory—satisfactory to others, that is. But several European experts in physiology have pursued the subject of the influence of food upon human beings, and one of these gentlemen has recently given expression to his convictions on this important point.

If you wish to make a perfect savage of the mildest man in existence says this physiologist, feed him exclusively on beef.

In about two months he would have become energetic and fool-hardy to a degree; after three months in most cases, that man would have become untameable as a wild bull, and it would be dangerous to go near him.

TO YOUNG LADIES.

The young lady who wishes to obtain a very beautiful soft and white skin should subsist constantly on milk and eggs and the individual, whether male or female, who desires to brighten the intellect and preserve it fresh and vigorous should eat largely of eggs. Butter has the effect of making us sleek pacific and lazy if taken in quantities daily; the person who thus indulges in this oleaginous aliment will soon become fatigued that he will be unfit for any kind of work or exercise.

Strong cheese is recommended in moderation; it is suitable to those who suffer from "nerves," for it acts as a sedative. But if eaten to excess its effects are not good.

It is a matter of common belief that mustard, taken internally, is a preventive of rheumatism. Our physiologist does not, unfortunately, touch on this point, but he tells us something else in connection with this condiment which is of great importance, namely, that mustard and memory go together. If you wish to have a good memory and to preserve it unimpaired as long as you live, you must eat plenty of mustard.

The old idea that fish is good for brain workers is scouted; those who live exclusively on a fish diet will in time and themselves on a level with the fish eating inhabitants of Northern Siberia, who rank as some of the least intellectual people on the face of the globe. The humble potato, too, comes in for condemnation, it being the conviction of our physiologist that a constant diet of this popular tuber causes ennui and fatigue of both mind and body.

A diet consisting entirely of vegetables—using the word vegetables in the purely cookery sense—is considered injurious, whereas fruit is highly extolled. Fruit of all kinds is highly beneficial, as it produces an exhilarating effect without muddling the brain, as does alcohol. On the subject of fruit as an article of food there is now a consensus of favorable opinion among modern physiologists. Applies for instance, are recommended as a brain food instead of fish; they contain a proportion of phosphorus, and the malic acid is of beneficial effect. Those who eat abundantly of this fruit—which does not mean immoderately—will not be slow to observe the advantages from a hygienic point of view. The apple as an article of food rather than an adjunct to the dessert, or as something to be munched between meals, has gained considerably in public favour in the last few years.

The proportion of fruit which may be eaten varies with the temperament; many people might subsist on a diet of which one-half was fruit.
