GLENNFINNAN NOTES.—The hay and root crops are much improved by the recent warm weather and rain, and the grain is looking remarkably well.—The East River Cheese factory is receiving from seven to eight thousand pounds daily and from eleven to twelve thousand on Mondays.—The new hall at Webster's Corner is nearly completed. It is 25 by 55 feet. It is built by an incorporated company.—James Bearl has returned from Dorchester where he visited his son-in-law, Mr. Herbert a caretaker. While there Mr. Bearl saw most of the Island prisoners.—The Farmer's Club at Webster's Corner have purchased two young bulls for the improvement of their stock.—Great preparations are being made for the tea at Fort Augustus on the 21st.

It is a practice in the state of Maine, whose sons are scattered to the ends of the earth, to appoint a time in each year which is called "Old Home Week." Invitations are sent in large numbers by the Governor of the State and the Mayors of towns and cities to all former residents, so far as their addresses can be learned, to revisit their old homes in the state. This year Old Home Week in Maine is August 2nd to 9th. Mr. Brown of the Florida Hotel, Pownal, has shown us an invitation he has received from Governor Hill and the Mayor of Rockland to revisit that place, where he formerly resided, on the date named. RICHARD Burke, Inspector has just completed his 3rd spraying tour throughout the country. The localities visited were Vernon River, Lower Montague, Cardigan York, Highfield, Pownal, Lot 48, Alberton O'Leary, Hamilton and Long River. This completes the third course of orchard instruction. Mr. Vroom accompanied Mr. Burke on the first two tours and was then called to hold meetings with Prof. Dean on agriculture and horticulture. Mr. Burke therefore finished the third tour alone. The promise for a good crop of apples Mr. Burke says is excellent. Cherries will be a light crop. Small fruits generally will be a good crop. The people in general have been very appreciative of these tours and a number of farmers are preparing to plant apple orchards and from present appearance apple growing will be one of our leading industries in a few years.

A SMALL, but highly representative meeting of the farmers of Lot 48, 49 and 50 was held in the Lyceum, Pownal on Wednesday 16th inst. Mr. A. A. Moore was called upon to preside. Mr. Crosby first addressed the meeting and told in a plain and forcible speech how the "boy" is generally used on the farm, and "how" he ought to be treated. Every farmer ought to subscribe to some good agricultural paper and other advice of a most practical kind. The chairman introduced the big gun Mr. Drummond of Ontario who, after a few well chosen remarks by way of preface, started in and by the aid of charts gave the farmers one of the most practical and instructive lessons, in agriculture, calf, dairy cow, beef and pig feeding, balanced rations, etc. etc. and for nearly two hours, held the audience spell bound, after which questions were fired in from every side and were all answered in a pleasing and most satisfactory manner. A hearty vote of thanks was tendered the speakers for their valuable advice which was suitably acknowledged. Those who did not attend missed a treat of a lifetime. We hope to have a visit from these gentlemen in the near future.
