In the above table Sulphate of Ammonia is shown as the only source of Nitrogen. In factory practice Cyanamid and Ammonium Nitrate are used in addition. These aggravate further the filler situation. When Borax or Magnesium is used the quantity of filler is slightly reduced.

2-15-6 and 3-15-6 are largely used for similar crops—Grain, Hay, Turf and Pastures. The latter contains more plant food and less "other materials", resulting in a lower cost per unit for the plant food.

4-8-10 and 5-10-10 are largely used for Potatoes. The latter contains more plant food and less "other materials", resulting in a lower cost per unit for the plant food.

"Other Materials" is usually Limestone, Sand, or a mixture of both. There is a limit to the quantity of Limestone that can be safely added to Mixed Fertilizers.

STALLION ENROLMENT

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this Province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded and carry an inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

Applications for enrolment should be accompanied with the required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour description and registration number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled or inspected, or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.

Weather Rough On Alberta Farmers

(By The Canadian Press)

CALGARY, April 6—Winter's lingering grip on Alberta today appears to be shaping into a major disaster as farmers faced the threat of heavy livestock losses, floods and a late seeding season. A serious shortage of livestock feed in rural areas, which Government officials at Edmonton described as "alarming", is causing the greatest immediate concern. But municipal officials in Central Alberta said flood damage caused by melting of the heavy layer of snow now on the ground might cause the heaviest losses.

A telegraphic survey conducted among Alberta Wheat Pool agents in various sections of Southern and Central Alberta showed eight out of 15 districts reporting the feed situation as "critical," five reported that heavy livestock losses had occurred already with cattle dying for lack of feed. An unconfirmed report from Fabyan, Alta., 145 miles southeast of Edmonton, said a farmer there had shot 19 head of cattle to prevent them from

starving to death. With the depth of snow ranging from 44 inches at Wagner, Alta., about 170 miles northwest of Edmonton, to 4 1/2 inches at Calgary, scores of farmers reported their cattle dying because they couldn't reach feed stacks. Northern Alberta, which experienced a record 17-inch snowfall during the weekend, and Central Alberta, are the hardest hit.

British, Soviet Officers Confer

BERLIN, April 6 (AP)—British and Soviet military officials met tonight behind the closely-guarded doors of a Gruenewald villa in the first such top-level get-together between East and West since the Russians walked out of the Allied Control Council three weeks ago.

The British demand for a full-scale investigation of the crash of a British transport plane and Soviet fighter which killed 26 persons, and the entire question of East-West relations in Berlin and Germany, may come up for clarification at this meeting.

Sitting down at dinner in the home of Gen. Sir Brian Robertson, British military governor, were the guest of honor, Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery, chief of the British Imperial Staff, Marshal Vasily Sokolovsky, Soviet military governor, and the Soviet and British deputy governors.

The Russians dashed up punctually in a late-model American sedan. British military police escorted them through the gate, guarded by a dozen M.P.s standing at attention in the rain.
