RT. HON. ANDRE FAUTEUX, K. C., SOLICITOR GENERAL

Rt. Hon. Andre Fauteux, K. C. of Montreal, has been appointed Solicitor General in the new Meighen Cabinet.

Mr. Fauteux is about forty-five years of age, and is not new in politics. He twice contested Two Mountains against J. A. C. Ethier, and was once defeated. In his second attempt in 1908, his nomination paper was rejected. Mr. Fauteux is adopted candidate for Terrebonne. It is rumored in political circles that, although the post of Solicitor General does not carry full Cabinet rank, the new appointee will be made a Privy Councillor. This would give him a seat at the Council Table.

## \$10,000,000 Contract To Montreal Company

Immense Power Plant to be Erected 63 Miles from Winnipeg. Between 1,000 and 2,500 Men Will be Employed.

WINNIPEG, Oct. 9.—Fraser, Brace and Company, contracting engineers, of Montreal, have been awarded contracts for the construction work on the \$10,000,000 power development scheme at Great Falls, on the Winnipeg river, sixty-three miles from here, by the Manitoba Power Company, Limited.

Development work is already under way, with about 200 men employed, and immediate employment for an additional 200 men will be found. Ultimately 1,000 to 2,500 men will be required to push work as rapidly as possible.

### League of Nations Society Holds First Meeting

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, Oct. 8.—The first meeting of the executive of the League of Nations society in Canada opened at the York club this morning with Sir Robert Borden, the president and Hon. N. W. Rowell, the chairman of the executive in attendance. The future of the society was reported to be very promising and a large meeting in Convocation Hall is expected tonight. At tonight's meeting, Sir Robert Borden will speak on the objects of the League of Nations and Mr. Rowell will review the two years of accomplishment of the League of Nations and Premier Drury will outline Canada's relation to the League of Nations. As Sir Robert was Canada's war premier and attended the Peace Conference and Mr. Rowell was a delegate to the first assembly of the League of Nations their addresses should have exceptional interest.

### Fears Entertained Of Missing Hunner

(Special to The Guardian) FORT WILLIAM, Ont., Oct. 8.—A special despatch to the Fort William Morning Bulletin from Atikokan says that Dr. Graham Chambers of Toronto has been missing since September 29th in the woods surrounding Clearwater. Two Fort Frances men with a party of twelve Indians are conducting a search. The country surrounding the lake is covered with brush, small lakes and streams. There are also a number of old mining shafts some of them very deep and it is feared that Dr. Chambers may have fallen down one of these. Further in the woods about in the vicinity and unless Dr. Chambers had matches with him with which to start a fire at night he would be in danger.

### Upper Silesian Question Nearing Settlement

(Special to The Guardian) GENEVA, Oct. 8.—The negotiations and deliberations of the council of the League of Nations on the Upper Silesian question virtually has been completed and it is expected its decision will be arrived at on Thursday next. The proposition of the council will be submitted unofficially to the French, British and Italian Governments in order to elicit the opinions of these Governments regarding the question before the council presents the official test of its findings.

### Suspects Arrested In Postal Robbery

DETROIT, Oct. 8.—Several suspects were held by police today in connection with the robbery here of a Canadian government truck of twenty-six registered mail pouches. Authorities today checked on the lot which they believed would total close to \$200,000. Canadian banks make a practice of sending to their Detroit correspondents each night their receipts of United States money. At times these shipments amount to as much as \$500,000. One of the bars according to the Windsor postal officials contained seventy-five pieces of registered mail for Detroit and one for Chicago yesterday's receipts at the Kenilworth race track it was believed were in the other.

### Four Out of 69 Pass Civil Service

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 7.—That of sixty-nine candidates who sat for the Civil Service examination last May to qualify as junior trade commissioners only four succeeded. They will be brought out in next week's bulletin of the Department of Trade and Commerce. Another examination will be held in November when four further vacancies will be filled. The examinations are not along academic lines, calling rather for a display of general intelligence and imagination in relation to Commercial matters.

## Liberal Leader Unable To Find Candidates

Meeting With Difficulty in Securing Men to Enter Field in His Cause. Perceptible Swing to Government.

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 7.—Polling day has been announced for Tuesday, December 6th, with nominations on November 22nd. This is in line with the government's desire for a campaign as lengthy as possible, its feeling being that under a campaign of education its policies will steadily gain in public support. Already it is believed there has been a perceptible swing toward the government throughout all of the provinces. Even in Quebec, which many ministerialists believed to be a forlorn hope, predictions are now being made that the government will carry twenty seats.

### Oppositions Lost.

A significant feature of the contest thus far is the slowness of both oppositions in getting candidates. While the government has ninety per cent of its candidates already in the field or in sight, Mr. Greer has few candidates outside of the West, and the rural ridings in Ontario. Thus far, he has not a single standard bearer in British Columbia, none in Quebec, no more than one or two in the Maritime Provinces and not one representative in a single city in the whole Dominion. ### Aged Couple Murdered

MONTREAL, Oct. 7.—Discovered by their daughter, with their heads beaten into pulp, probably by blows from an axe, the bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Onofre Batura, an elderly couple resident at 385 Fourteenth Ave., Lachine, were found this afternoon in their home.

The motive for the double murder is given by the provincial and Lachine police as revenge, and a man, Stanislas Tomachuk, aged 49, is being held as a witness for the inquiry. Tomachuk stated today that he lived in Toronto and arrived in Lachine this morning, but refuses to make any further statement in connection with the affair.

### First Snowfall in Manitoba

WINNIPEG, Oct. 5.—Half an inch of snow is reported to have fallen Thursday evening at Marquette, Man. A light snow also is reported from Reburn. These are the first reports of snow in this province although a very slight flurry occurred here yesterday at noon lasting a few minutes.

Hon. Mr. Rodolphe Monty, who has lived all his life in Montreal is a brilliant speaker, an excellent lawyer and the head of one of the most important law firms in Montreal. He was educated at the College of Ste. Marie du Mont and afterwards studied law at the Universities of McGill and Laval, obtaining the "B. A." and "LL. B." The new minister of justice took an active part in the life, even in the University debates. He was president of the Junior Conservative Club of Montreal, and also the Carlton Club of the same city. In his profession his ability was soon recognized by his associates and he was appointed Councillor and Treasurer of the Bar of the Montreal District and later was elected Examiner of the Bar of the Province of Quebec. In all the recent political campaigns he has taken a very active part. Among his associates in Montreal and in the Conservative Party throughout the Province, he is looked upon as one of the strong men and as a campaign worker and organizer has few equals.
