No "Kid Glove" Tactics With Rangers, Boucher Says; Irvin Annoyed Over Beating

WINNIPEG, Oct. 20 (CP)—Coach Frank Boucher of New York Rangers announced today that he will be "no kid glove" tactics in his handling of the National Hockey League club that finished fourth in the Stanley Cup playoffs.

Since the Rangers' camp opened eight days ago there hasn't been a day off. Boucher sent the players through a workout yesterday through a "Sunday" rest camp.

Irvin was annoyed at ST. HYACINTHE, Que., Oct. 20 (CP)—Still a trifle annoyed at Montreal Canadiens 2-1 loss to the Quebec Royals of the Quebec Senior Hockey League, Coach Irvin of the National Hockey League Canadiens today put his team through a light practice at the arena here.

The day started with a morning game, omitting the usual physical training period. This afternoon there was a wide-open scrimmage with no body-checking stage game with no body-checking allowed as Irvin wanted the players to get practice in "just putting that puck in the net."

Ray Getliffe and Murph Chamberlain, with three goals apiece, paced the Reds to a 11-7 win over the Whites in the daily practice game. Herman Gruhn, with two goals, and Johnny Quilly, Jack Portland and Bobby Walton, with one each, rounded the Reds' scoring. For the Whites, Elmer Lech counted three tallies, while Toe Blake and Charlie Sands counted two apiece.

To Have Practice Game
HERSHEY, Pa., Oct. 20 (AP)—Boston Bruins, Stanley Cup champions, their pre-season drills only a day old, advanced to the scrimmage stage today as they rushed preparations for their first practice game Wednesday night with Hershey Bears of the American Hockey League.

In addition to his squad from last year, Manager Art Ross is looking over a dozen recruits to see if they can fit into the picture this season.

After Wednesday night's tilt, the two teams will meet again Saturday night with a third and final game scheduled for a week from Wednesday.

Bonura gets Discharge From army

CAMP SHELBY, Miss., Oct. 20 (AP)—Grinning Zeke Bonura, who spent seven years being shunted from one major league baseball club to another, was released again today—from the United States army.

Discharged because the draft age has been lowered to 28 since his induction May 19, the 33-year-old first baseman said he expects to be back in baseball next spring. But as usual his affairs are muddled and he'll have to ask Baseball Commissioner K. M. Landis which club owns him.

Bonura claimed today Chicago Cubs sold him to Minneapolis early last season "when they discovered I was going to be draft bait." He was leading the American Association in hitting and apparently headed back to the majors when the army called.

"I don't know what club I belong to now," he said. "Things are so mixed up, I'll have to see Judge Landis to find out where I stand."

Kelley Knows the Answer
MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 20 (AP)—If Zeke Bonura, now discharged from the army and preparing to re-enter organized baseball, wants to know where he belongs all he has to do is ask Mike Kelley owner of Minneapolis Millers—not baseball commissioner K. M. Landis.

Bonura, discharged from the army because the draft age has been lowered to 28 said he didn't know what club he belongs to now. But Kelley said tonight he knows where Bonura belongs.

"He belongs to me," said the Millers owner. "I bought him from Chicago Cubs last winter. I had until June 15 to keep or reject him. I decided to keep him, of course, and paid for him in full after he was inducted into the service."

Faced With Loss Of Five Players New York Amerks Boss Working On New "Kid Line"

PORT ARTHUR, Oct. 20 (CP)—Faced with the possible loss of five men due to the refusal of the Manitoba and Saskatchewan War Services Boards to grant passport authority to hockey players of military age, Mervyn (Red) Dutton, manager of the National Hockey League New York Americans, is grooming a new "kid line" at his fall training camp here.

The youngsters all played with outstanding junior amateur teams last winter and Dutton said today they will move up to the N.H.L. this winter as a unit "if they make the grade."

Members of the potential "kid line" are left winger Harry Watson who played last winter with Saskatoon Quakers, western finalists, and Ken Mosdell and Jimmy Peters, centre and right winger respectively from Montreal Royals, champions of Eastern Canada last season.

(Dutton has just returned from a trip to Saskatoon where he conferred with the Saskatchewan War Services Board on the passport question. After the conference, A. C. Stewart, Yorkton, Sask., board member, said in an interview "there will be no postponement for any persons liable for military service—they be hockey players or mennots.")

Dutton not To return to Port Arthur

PORT ARTHUR, Oct. 20 (CP)—Mervyn (Red) Dutton, manager of New York Americans National Hockey League team announced today that "under present conditions, I definitely won't come back to Port Arthur another year" for Americans' pre-season training.

Dutton said the Port Arthur rink can not accommodate three clubs for training. Clubs at present working out here are Americans, Springfield Indians of the American League and St. Louis Flyers of the American Association.

"Neither myself nor Eddie Shore (manager of Springfield) will come back another year if the rink is going to try to accommodate three clubs," he said.

Lenard far In front in Scoring race

TORONTO, Oct. 20 (CP)—Hamilton's Al Lenard increased his lead in the eastern football individual scoring championship race Saturday as he scored seven points in the 39-7 lacing his Wildcat team handed Kitchener-Waterloo panthers. His field goal, two singles and two converts gave him a total of 30 points.

Lenard's closest competitors were a team-mate, Teddy Manorek, and Annis Stukus of Toronto Argonauts, each of whom has 15 points. Manorek was Saturday's leading scorer with two touchdowns while Stukus managed to hold on to his eastern union leadership despite the fact he scored only one single in Argos' 12-7 victory over Montreal Bulldogs, he said.
