Looking A Gift Horse, etc.

Some interesting circumstances are connected with the recent gift of \$100,000 to an American college by Mr. John D. Rockefeller, the well-known multi-millionaire. There was considerable hesitation in accepting it. Mr. Rockefeller, it appears, promised the princely amount upon solicitation of one of the trustees, if the debt on the institution was wiped off by other means. Upon this promise, the alumnae, by dint of hard work, raised the desired sum, but when the time arrived for the acceptance of the gift, some of the professors, who had severely denounced "trusts" in their class-rooms, protested against the money being taken. They framed a formidable indictment of the Standard Oil Company, of which Mr. Rockefeller is the head, in which the business methods of that gigantic corporation were scathingly criticized and violently denounced. It was finally agreed to refer the controversy to a Cornell professor of political economy, who, in his capacity, of "referee," decided in favor of the endowment on the broad theory that a college is a public institution maintained for public ends, and, in a sense, holds its resources in trust for the public, so that any money, no matter what source it comes from, may be honourably accepted by an institution of learning for the general good of society.

We do not know that the decision was very gratifying to Mr. Rockefeller—or that the question of the acceptance of his gift being a subject of dispute was complimentary to him—but the college gets the money, and that is the main thing. If some public spirited citizen of Montreal should win a big prize in one of the local art lotteries and offer it to McGill, would its refusal on high moral grounds be wise—or otherwise? There is an old saying about not looking a gift horse in the mouth, and perhaps it is not always wisdom to inspect the animal too closely.—Montreal Herald.

Cuban Independence.

Up to within the last few months there was a general belief in all parts of this country that, in some way or another, the political independence that had been promised to the Cubans would not be accorded to them. We think, a year or more ago, public opinion in the United States was distinctly opposed to the notion of permitting the Cubans to set up a government on their own account; and if the administration at Washington had at that time taken such action as it has recently taken in the furtherance of this plan, it would have met with the vehement protests coming from a large majority of members of its party. But of late we have grown wisely distrustful of our ability to bring contentment and happiness into the lives of inferior races by establishing our rule over them. The attempt to benevolently assimilate the Filipinos has dragged on month after month, with no approach toward what can be called an undoubted success. It is to be feared that, if we were to deny to the Cubans the political independence we have promised to them, such denial would be followed on their part by a prompt uprising against us, and we have had too much experience in guerilla warfare on the island of Luzon to wish to encourage this form of resistance on the island of Cuba. The Cubans who desire independence are profiting by the unwillingness of their former associates in Spanish colonial control, the Filipinos, to peacefully accept our sovereignty. If the contest that has been going on for so long a time in our Asiatic possession had not occurred, the strong desire of the American people to possess Cuba might have overridden the declarations of the President and the professions of disinterestedness made by Congress at the time of the outbreak of war with Spain. The Filipinos have in this way helped to give political independence to others, even if they have not obtained their own.

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

And its Attractions to Tourists.

Prince Edward Island's summer climate is delightful, and the scenery is beautiful and quietly picturesque. Surrounded by the Gulf of St. Lawrence, it enjoys all the coolness of the sea breeze, and the advantages that can only be derived from sea bathing, at about 65 degrees.

Charlottetown has over 12,000 inhabitants, and is the capital. It has many great retail stores, besides a large wholesale trade. It has a Gas Light and Power Company, two Electric Light plants, and a street railway in embryo. It has a first class water works and sewerage system. It is famed for its wide and shaded streets its many pleasant drives, the principal of which is the new Park Boulevard, its attractive surroundings, pure water and clear, cool and bracing air. It is widely known as one of the healthiest cities in Canada. It has two hospitals, many churches and a large and elegant new Opera house. It also has several fine public buildings and a market which is one of the chief sources of the citizens' here. It has one of the largest and best equipped pork-packing establishments in the Dominion. On its west side Victoria Park—a favorite summer resort—while on the east are the magnificent new Exhibition Buildings and Driving Park. Chief among its public squares is Queen Square in the centre of the city, beautifully laid out with blooming plants of every description, fountains, and well arranged walks, and enlivened with a band of music during the summer evenings. The rural scenery in the vicinity of Charlottetown is charming, and horses for driving are abundant at very low prices. Boats can also be hired, and steamers run regularly on the bays and rivers, affording most pleasant excursions. The principal hotels are Davies, Queen, and Revere.

Summerside has about 3000 inhabitants. It is situated on beautiful Bedeque Bay. It has the largest and finest departmental store in the Maritime Provinces, besides having other large retail stores. It has an Electric Light Plant, and a water works system and sewerage are being agitated for. The hotels are—Clifton, Queen, Russ Strathcona and Campbell. Georgetown and Souris have a population of about 1,000 each. In the former are the Aitken, and Tapper hotels and in Souris the Sea View.

At Cape Traverse, a very pleasant summer resort, is the Landsdowne hotel; in Alberton, the Albion Terrace and Wisner; in Tignish the Railway and Bellevue; in Kensington, Clark's and Commercial; in Montague, McDonald's; and in Mount Stewart, Clark's and Manson's.

The following hotels open for the summer season: At Hampton, Pleasant View; at Stanhope, Mutch's and Cliff; at Brackley Point, Shaw's; at Rustico, Sea side; at Malpeque, North Shore; at Tracadie Beach, Acadia; at Alberton, Seaforth; and at Powna: Florida.

In addition to those already mentioned there are other towns and villages in the Province with hotel accommodation, while many farm houses prepare for the reception of tourists. The rivers and streams teem with trout, the bays with mackerel, while game of every description abounds.
