## Oldest Locomotive

(Continued from page 1)

W. U. Appleton, General Manager of the Atlantic region of the Canadian National, accepting the custody of the locomotives made comparisons with the Samson with the huge 6100 locomotive of the National System which was brought in to the station and placed near the ancient progenitors. The draw pull bar of the Samson was about one thousand pounds where that of the greatest locomotive in the British Empire, the sixty one hundred of the National system had a draw bar pull of seventy thousand pounds or seventy times that of its miniature that sat beside it. Commensurate with all this was the extraordinary development of roadway and track which had to be made in order to permit the present mighty "power houses" of locomotives weighing three hundred and thirty tons to travel sixty miles an hour over the country.

He read from a letter written by a prominent Nova Scotian when visiting in England in 1839 and describing a train journey at twenty five miles an hour "a tremendous speed" with the Acadia of today which operates between Halifax and Montreal covering that distance, eight hundred and forty two miles, in twenty-four hours.

In the absence of Hon. J. C. Tory, Lieut. Governor of the province, the administrator Hon. Chief Justice Harris presided. The vice American consul General Magnushon was among the speakers. The ceremony took place beneath the draped flags of the empire and the republic and as the American representative rose to speak the band played the star spangled banner. Among others present was S. L. Gibson, son in law of Hon. W. A. Black and who was the originator of having the engines returned. The two engines were sent back to Canada several weeks ago, the Baltimore-Ohio bringing them to the frontier and from the frontier gateway Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National, had them taken over and brought free of charge to Halifax where they were refurnished and put into place.

## THE MARKETS

### EGGS

OTTAWA, June 21.—Egg receipts continue to decline and the markets are holding firm.

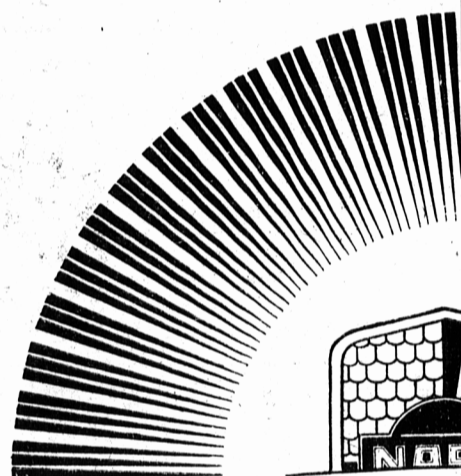
TORONTO.—The local market is unchanged with dealers buying from country shippers at extras 32-34c; firsts 29-31c; seconds 23-24. Receipts are still declining.

MONTREAL.—The local egg market is firm. Sales are being made in a jobbing way at extras 37 1-2c; firsts 34 1-2c; seconds 28.

WINNIPEG.—Prices on this market are unchanged with the general situation firm. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 29-30c; firsts 27c; seconds 23c.

SASKATOON.—The local egg receipts continue light. Dealers are buying from country shippers at extras 25c; firsts 23c; seconds 18c.

MONTREAL, Que., June 21.—The trade in cash grain here today was quiet owing to the fact that exporters showed little interest and the demand from domestic and country buyers was confined to carlots to meet immediate wants. The undertone was steady and prices showed no change. Argentine corn was very firm at \$1.21 per bushel, ex-store on account of the very limited supplies now available on spot. A feature of the flour trade was the increased demand from the United Kingdom and the continent for spring wheat and a very fair volume of business was accomplished with the result that the market was more active in this respect, but there was no marked improvement in cash wheat prices at Winnipeg. There were no new developments in the condition of the winter wheat flour trade, prices being maintained with a small business passing. The market for millfeed was without any feature to note prices being steady with a fair amount of business passing. The trade in standard grades of rolled oats continued slow and prices were unchanged. There was no further development in the local egg situation, but the undertone to the market was very firm for fresh extras on account of the continued small offerings from Ontario shippers which is attributed to the warmer weather prevailing and the decreased percentage of this grade in the supplies coming forward from producers. There continues to be a good demand from dealers for extras and further sales were made at 35 1-2c. per dozen, f. o. b. Ontario shipping points. A good steady trade was done in a jobbing way. The receipts were 8,000 cases. Owing to the smaller receipts of potatoes and the somewhat limited supplies available on spot at present a very firm feeling prevailed in the market and prices were fully maintained at the late advance established. There was a steady demand from local buyers and the bulk of the offerings of

## CANADIAN NATIONAL

### RUST OF HOLLYHOCK

This is the most common disease of hollyhocks. It causes brownish, raised pimple-like spots which are circular or elongated, and may be present on both stems and leaves. At maturity the skin breaks over these areas and discharges a brownish powder, the spores of the fungus causing the disease, and by which it is spread from plant to plant. In our climate this disease occurs in such quantity that the proper development and normal functions of the leaves may be seriously hindered.

### When severe it is practically impossible to control this disease, and it is advisable to destroy the old plants and start with new stock. All old plants and litter around the plants should be burned early in the Fall. This is important in order to destroy any spores which would remain alive until Spring and cause infection. In the Spring pick off and burn all diseased leaves as they appear.

Spraying with Bordeaux mixture, (4-4-40), Lime sulphur, or Potassium permanganate will help to check the rust if applied every week after the plants are six inches high. These treatments, however, are displeasing to the eye and spoil the plants for ornamental purposes. Sulphur dust has been tried with some success, but only in cases of moderate infection. Applications must be made to both surfaces of the leaves, particularly the lower where the rust is usually most abundant. If dust is used it should be applied early in the morning when the dew is on the leaves.

### CANDLES

Candles in candle sticks are in high favor as decorations in the colonial homes of today; but a tippy candle which will not stand straight is not an object of beauty. They must be primly erect to add to the beauty of a room. To hold them so, set them in rubber sockets which may be found in the shops, or fasten them in putty, or even in soft gum which has been chewed, or, if none of these are available, melt the end of the candle, and set it in place while the grease is still dripping.
