## Saints Score 10-4 Win Over Crystals In Game At Forum Last Night

A. J. McAdam's Saint Dunstan's University pucksters scored a decisive 10-4 victory over the Summerside Crystals at the Forum last night to move into a second place tie with the Charlottetown Victorias, four points behind the League-leading Abegweit, in Island Intermediate Hockey League competition.

Outshooting and outskating their opponents, the Saints piled up a 5-3 lead by the end of the first period, 8-4 at the end of the second, and holding their opponents scoreless in the third, banged home two more in that frame to take the game by a liberal six-goal margin.

The game was a rough and ready affair all the way, with a total of 23 penalties being handed out by referees Charley Hogan and Leith Jay, including two misconducts and one major. Eleven were awarded to the Saints and twelve to Crystals.

The Saints held a definite edge on the play in the first and second periods to force the attack deep into the Crystals zone, where they hammered away with a barrage of goals. Sprague, who came up with a sensational job in the nets to prevent the Saints from getting many more goals than they did.

Cliff Bernard was the big goal-getter of the night when he made the red light four times, while linerage Joe Mahar came up with a smart performance with two goals and an assist. Stan Delghan made it a power packed line when he collected three assists on Bernard's and Mahar's goals. Ayers, Rodgers Farmer and McIsaac were the other Saints snipers.

Hard-working Gordie Kelly ratted home two of the visitors tallies in a row, while Joey Schurman, and Davis got the other Summerside counters.
