AMOS ROBB, North Milton, has almost  
completed the inside finishing of the  
house which he erected last fall. The  
residence is laid off in a most convenient  
manner and is thoroughly up to date.

the work in a very creditable manner.

CHAS. J. Stewart of Southport and for  
some years with the Merchants Bank of  
P. E. I. in Alberton and Sydney has been  
appointed General Agent of the Confed-  
eration Life Association for Prince Ed-  
ward Island commencing May 1st. Many  
friends will be pleased to see Mr. Stewart  
again after several years absence.

LAST Saturday night the ferry waiting  
house at Southport was considerably  
damaged by some vandals who broke the  
windows of the ticket office, waiting  
room, and glass in the upstairs window  
with several of the sashes. The depart-  
ment of Public Works intend sparing no  
pains to discover and punish the guilty  
parties.

At the Police Court yesterday Stipendiary  
McDonald was again on the bench  
after a week's illness. Three drunks were  
disposed of as follows:—Emanuel Byers,  
dismissed; Henry Brown, \$10 or 30 days;  
Edgar McCarron, \$5 or 30 days. Henry  
Palmer who broke jail a year ago was also  
arraigned. Jailer Hamill told of the  
manner of his escape. He with William  
McCabe, who was since recaptured and  
is now serving sentence, had burst the  
lock of their cell which enabled them to  
reach the adjoining one, known as the Young cell,  
really a lean to the main building. There  
they removed stones of the fourda lot,  
and burrowed through the wall, nearly  
three feet in thickness, till they breathed  
again the air of freedom. It was a small  
job to scale the jail fence in the night and  
for the time place themselves beyond  
reach of the authorities. Palmer was  
remanded to stand trial in the Supreme  
Court.

The work on the Granville circuit is

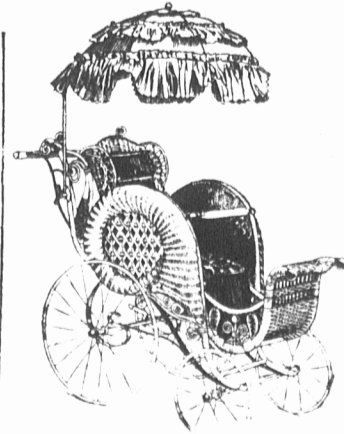
