Proceedings in The Legislature

second reading of an Act to amend the Public School Act, (Mr. McArthur in the chair.)

Clause 5 of the act, which raised the necessary average daily attendance at public schools from fifty to sixty per cent, came in for some discussion. Messrs. Arsenault, A. E. McLean, Metherall, Denis, and Dewar contended that in many districts it was the very young children whose attendance would be too high to expect. In cases where schools fell below the set average the teacher's salaries would have to be paid, not from the Provincial Treasury, but from the districts, and this, it was contended would work hardship on many cases. Hon. Mr. Cross believed that by raising the minimum school age from five to six years (provided for in the first clause of the bill) the falling off in the attendance of children under six should have the effect of raising the average attendance, as in stormy weather it was the very young children whose attendance would show most irregularity. Mr. J. D. Stewart maintained that if the minimum school age was defined at seven years an even better average attendance would be assured. Mr. Metherall believed that to meddle with the fifty per cent average set forth in the original act would be to rouse the displeasure of the people from one end of the province to the other.

CENSUS.—Major T. Edgar McNeat, Census Commissioner for Queens County reports that in so far as arrangements can be made everything is all ready for the very often in the winter months the condition of the roads was a serious handicap. The Superintendent was still new on the job, and it would be a good idea if he would make a new department and visit the people in various sections of the country for the purpose of talking over educational matters with them and thus enlist their sympathetic interest. To compel people by legislation (as in the proposed raising of the average percentage of attendance which would impose additional burdens upon those sections of the province which were already suffering) was a very dangerous proceeding. The matter should be thoroughly inquired into by the Superintendent of Education and the opinion of the people elicited. They should at least be given an opportunity to recover from several sections of the province whose best policy would be to go slow.

SPLENDID WORKMANSHIP.—That Island workmanship is fully up to the standard of the best anywhere is fully demonstrated in some examples of carpentry recently executed by two Charlottetown carpenters, Messrs Wm. J. Hennessy and Edgar Walker. The work comprises five large cases built of solid mahogany and intended for the holding of vestments, etc., in the sacristy of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, situated at the rear of the main church. The largest of these cases is twenty four feet in length and nine feet in height and the others are nine feet long. The whole intricate job of making these cases with their various receptacles has called for skilled workmanship of a high order and an excellent job has certainly been done.

PREMIER BELL maintained that there was much dissatisfaction among the people with regard to School Trustees' valuations. The percentage of valuation differs in many districts, and is the cause of much bickering among neighbors.

HON. MR. JOHNSTON had serious doubts as to the advisability of changing the original Act in this respect. He did not think people would subscribe to the same valuation for Provincial purposes as for school purposes.

MR. DEWAR believed the Provincial Assessor's burdens should be lessened.

MR. ARSENAULT objected to the clause and its various subsections as being too cumbersome. He could not see what necessity there was for examining the revenues of the districts before making the assessment.

MR. ARSENAULT supported the contention of the Attorney General as to the advisability of any change in the original Act. At present the act really works the other way in some cases for the Assessor's sake their valuation from the school districts.

MR. STEWART believed the clause was very awkward and cumbersome. He supported the Attorney General and Mr. Arsenault in the opinion that it had much better be left out.

MR. A. E. MCLEAN suggested leaving the matter with the districts to make out their own rolls as has been done heretofore.

MR. LEPAGE believed the clause was quite a proper one and that it would facilitate the work of the Provincial Secretary. He argued that to the great majority of people the change would be welcomed and that it was the only way of getting uniform valuation.

MR. DENNIS believed the people were indignant enough now about the subject of valuation, and that to saddle the new thing on them would be unwelcome. The Provincial valuation is often unfairly put on land, he contended.

MR. BROUW was of the opinion that the trustees of the school districts would make much better valuers of land than the Provincial assessors.

should be raised rather than lowered at the discretion of the Board of Education. Premier Bell cited two or three cases of persons eminently qualified to teach but who were at present debarred because not holding necessary certificates. They were not intending ultimately to become teachers, but were qualified to fill in gaps. Mr. Stewart maintained that these persons should take the college examinations and thus qualify in the regular way. In reply to Mr. Arsenault Premier Bell stated that no persons had yet been granted licenses in other than the regular way. Persons failing in the regular examinations had qualified themselves by passing supplemental tests but this was no departure from precedent.

The Attorney General maintained that any lowering of the standard by granting licenses at the discretion of the Board of Education would have a demoralizing effect upon the whole curriculum. Pupils might never enter the Prince of Wales College or the Normal School or they might fall in their examinations there, and yet be able to secure licenses and place themselves on an equal with college graduates. Mr. Arsenault supported this contention. Students who fail always have some excuse, and they will be continually trying to get in through the open door of the statute. Mr. Lepage argued that the clause was just to provide for necessity. Mr. Stewart pointed out that it was here the danger lay. Our educational system already provides for times of unusual stress, and he thought the act had much better be left as it was. Premier Bell pleaded that the measure was only a temporary

one, and was framed for the purpose of getting all the districts supplied with teachers. Mr. Arsenault retorted that by so doing the government was only inviting further trouble for itself. There are already too many of these half-qualified teachers trying to get licenses. Hon. Mr. Cox and Mr. Hessian supported the Premier's argument. The clause was finally passed.

After the passing of the clause the Attorney General seriously urged a reconsideration of it. He emphasized his conviction that it would be very dangerous to the educational system of the province. The clause, however was allowed to stand.

The bill was agreed to with amendments and the House adjourned until the following morning.
