VITAL STATISTICS REPORT-103 births were registered in Charlottetown for the month of December, last; one stillbirth; 15 marriages; and 33 deaths. The figures, tabulated in the monthly report of Dr. B. C. Keeping, City Health Officer, were submitted to the City Council last night.

CONFERENCE PLANNED-Mr. W. R. Shaw, Deputy Minister of Agriculture and chairman of the Prince Edward Island Agricultural Council, announced yesterday that the annual conference of that body will be held at Birch Court at the Experimental Farm on January 19 and 20. The conference is composed of personnel of both the Dominion and Provincial Departments of Agriculture.

RETURNS FROM OTTAWA - Brig. W. W. Reid returned last night from Ottawa where he attended a series of meetings, including a conference of the National Council on Physical Fitness and a meeting of Dominion sports governing bodies. Brig. Reid said the mid-western winter was still considerable snow in the Dominion Capital.

TO TAKE STATISTICAL COURSE - Mr. William Crockett, director of vital statistics, Provincial Department of Health and Welfare, left Saturday for Ottawa where he will take a special course of training in advanced statistical methods and procedures of the Federal Government's health plan. Through special arrangement with the Dominion statistician the course which will last from two to three months will be taken at the Dominion Bureau of Statistics.

BUDDING TWIGS RECEIVED - Dog-woods are budding in the Tryon district and "in running" just like a day in April. In the maple grove, Mr. Fred A. Laird reports from that district sending The Guardian a number of dog-wood twigs as evidence. Picked on the woods of the "Highland" on January 7th, they were found on "high land, not near any swamp or spring." Mr. Laird also reports that Messrs. Walter Bell and Newton Mayhew were plowing on January 1st and 3rd.

HEALTH REPORT - No new cases of tuberculosis were discovered in Charlottetown last month, the report of Dr. B. C. Keeping, City Health Officer, informed the City Council last night. The report went on to state that patients from the City are now in the Sanatorium and that there are seven others with active tuberculosis who should be admitted. There were no new patients suffering from venereal disease for the month of December. There are five old cases, two male and three female.

impossible to locate it anywhere in the City where it will not cause some inconvenience to someone." Coun. Lester O'Donnell said he understood the plan was registered in the Exchequer Court of Canada and that the Government had the power to appropriate for the proposed site if necessary. He did not see, therefore, that much could be done to alter the Government's decision.

Business Tax Bylaw

The third reading of the Business Tax bylaw was adjourned until the regular February meeting of the Council. The proposed imposition of such a tax was having an unfavourable reaction among many citizens. The Mayor said it was, therefore, his personal opinion that "we should proceed slowly with it."

By-Election Jan. 27

January 27 was fixed as the date on which a civic election will be held in Ward 3 to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Coun. Doyle. Commenting on a written protest received by the City Clerk from the Charlottetown milk vendors respecting their annual payment of \$3 to the City, the Mayor said the payment had been exacted from the vendors for the inspection of their barns by the City's sanitary officer. As he was informed that no inspection had been made since the death of the late Dr. Croken, he would recommend that the \$3 be returned to the milkmen. "It is only a small matter," the Mayor said. He added, "In fact, the whole matter is pretty small."

Coun. C. M. Cox served notice that at the next regular meeting he would introduce a resolution to amend the milk by-law.

The meeting was a brief one. No reports were read. The Mayor explained that all reports would be read at the next regular meeting which would be the last in the City's fiscal year. The following resolution was passed: That this Council record the loss suffered by the Council and City by the death of Mr. Samuel Doyle, late Councillor for Ward Three, and convey to the wife and family of the deceased the sincere sympathy of this Council.

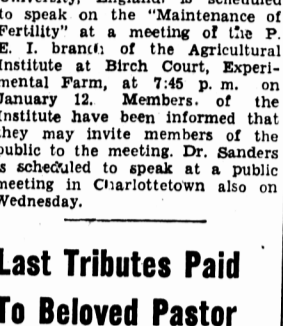

He did not give an inch in his demands for the vast social and economic program he demanded in his state-of-the-union message; such as housing, better schools, more social security benefits.

On the defence front, he stressed the importance of air power, but frowned on the idea of a 70-group air force, which has been heavily backed in Congress, and by the air generals. Truman said that number and size of planes, rather than number of groups, is a better gauge of air force strength.

Republicans called the Truman figures dangerous, reckless and over-estimated. But administration forces showed no sign of discontent.

Representative Clarence Cannon (Dem. Mo.) called the budget "the most practical that could be presented at this time." Cannon will head the House of Representatives appropriations committee where spending bills originate.

The committee's senior Republican, Representative John Taber of New York, observed "they've evidently given everybody everything they asked for."

The budget is \$873,000,000 bigger than the Government's prospective income of \$498,000,000 in the year ahead. It figures out

to \$282.82 apiece for every American. Yet it doesn't even take into account plans for providing military supplies for Western Europe and "certain other" unnamed countries. Truman said he would ask for money for that "later."

He said, too, that "It must be recognized that expenditures in the fiscal year 1951 are likely to be larger than those for 1950. Expenditures for national defence can be expected to rise substantially above the level estimated for 1950."

The budget message included a \$20,000,000 estimate for the proposed St. Lawrence seaway and power project, without giving any breakdown showing how the furd would be expended. The President also recommended \$56,000,000 for a proposed international wheat agreement.

He suggested an additional \$2,000,000,000 in payroll taxes, on business and individuals, to finance his program of new or bigger social security benefits.

For one thing, he said, he wants the present one-per-cent rate on workers and their employers boosted to 1 1/2 per cent each next July 1. That is six months ahead of the schedule Congress set.

By the same date he wants "nearly" all the 25,000,000 gainfully employed persons not now covered brought into the old-age insurance system. They would pay taxes, too.

The President is counting on raising \$260,000,000 with a health insurance program with a payroll tax of one-quarter of one per cent each on companies and workers. But only \$15,000,000 of that would be spent the first year.

Keyes, Charlottetown Detachment, has been transferred to Headquarters Staff and will be in charge of Q.R. and Q.M. Cpl. W. Swindell, Alberton Detachment, has been transferred to Charlottetown to take charge of the Charlottetown Detachment. Cpl. M. W. Hagen has been transferred from Charlottetown to Alberton, replacing Cpl. Swindell. Cpl. W. H. Warner has been transferred from Charlottetown to Charlottetown Detachment, replacing Cpl. Hagen.
