

**Shipments Of Russian Wheat Are Falling Off**

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 1. (By the Canadian Press)—The falling off in shipments of wheat from Russia is confirmed in advices received by the Department of Trade and Commerce here. This falling off is regarded in some quarters as one of the factors contributing to the rise in wheat prices during the past week.

In a statement issued yesterday by Hon. H. H. Stevens, it was announced that shipments of wheat from Russia for the week ending Oct. 29 amounted to 2,068,000 bushels compared to 4,040,000 bushels last week and 3,504,000 bushels for the corresponding week last year. Shipments for the past week, the statement declared, were the smallest during the past 3 months. For the four weeks ending October 29, Russian shipments amounted to 12,608,000 bushels compared to 18,280,000 bushels for the same period last year.

An interesting comment on the Russian situation is found in the "Daily Freight Register" of October 14:

"Furthermore, had Russia been taking tonnage freely for November, the supply of unfixed steamers in the Mediterranean would not have to look for alternative employment involving a ballast voyage to South America. As matters are in the Black Sea the outlook is discouraging, as grain cargo is apparently coming forward very slowly, and shippers are exercising operations whereby owners are taking coal from Maritupol, also ore from Potincolaeff to the United States. Instead of grain to the continent. In addition, we are officially informed that a couple of steamers fixed for grain have been cancelled by mutual agreement."

**Canada Sends Goodwill Cargo To Australia**

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 1.—(By the Canadian Press)—In two steamers, one leaving here tomorrow and another to leave Vancouver shortly, Canada is sending a large and varied consignment of her goods to be submitted for approval to the Australia retailer and consumer.

The Canadian Constructor, official "good-will" ship from Australia to Canada and from Canada to Australia, will leave here in the morning with a cargo which includes carbon paper, sardines, print, wrapping paper, ammunition, wooden handles, vacuum cleaners, pipes, pipe cleaners, cotton twist, wallpaper, golf tees, lumber, wire, valves, canvas shoes, drugs, range parts and saws.

Almost at the same time the Constructor reaches Australia a second cargo of British Columbia products will arrive, J. E. Walsh, chairman of the Canadian-Australian Trade committee and secretary-manager of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association stated at a luncheon given today by L. R. MacGregor, Australian Trade Commissioner and other prominent Australians to Canadian guests including Hon. A. Duranleau, Minister of Marine.

In this cargo would be included 600 tons of newsprint, 300 tons of woodpulp with possibly another 400 to be shipped during November; 2,000,000 fruit wraps, 5,500 cases canned salmon, 75,000 apple boxes, with another 410,000 for delivery early in January and 10,000,000 feet of lumber.

The Canadian Constructor brought from Australia two kangaroos; on her return trip she will take a beaver, two bear-cubs, two racoons, and two Holstein cows as examples of what animals find their homes in this country.

**"Emperor Cook" CELEBRATE ADVANCE IN PRICES**

In Dead

LONDON, Nov. 2.—(A.P.)—A. J. Cook, Secretary of the Miners' Federation of Great Britain and leading figure in Labor-political activities died at 4:15 A. M. today. He was 46 years old.

Cook was known as "the fire-brand" of the Labor party. The newspapers dubbed him "Emperor Cook" during the general strike of 1928.

He died at a hospital in Hampstead which he entered in September and was operated upon for a glandular swelling in the neck. The operation was successful and he improved considerably up to Oct. 20 when his condition began to grow worse.

The miners' Federation, of which he was secretary, has more than 1,000,000 members.

On a visit to Leningrad a few years ago he left the following written oath in the Lenin room of the Smolny Institute.

"To Lenin's teachings, to the tremendous work begun by him, I shall devote all my strength as his living disciple. Hail, the Soviets, hail, revolution."

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**Stockings Will Be Shorter To Contest By Election**

(Special to the Guardian)

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2.—The standardization program that President Hoover fostered as Secretary of Commerce, brought an agreement today to shorten the length of Mid-jadys silk stockings. Hosiery for men too is to be standardized at shorter lengths under an agreement between manufacturers and officials of the Federal Bureau of Standards.

Hereafter women's stockings are to be 30 inches in length men's will be 14 inches in size 10 and under and 14 1-2 inches for larger sizes.

Elimination of variations in length is of economic importance to both the wearer and the manufacturer—the Bureau of Standards said.

The Conservative candidate is W. P. Gamble, who was chosen at a convention last Saturday.

**Foreman Wins Over Davies**

LONDON, Nov. 2.—Al Foreman, lightweight boxing champion of England last night defeated the Welsh lightweight, Selwyn Davies, on points, in a bout fought at the stadium club.

Al Foreman, who resides in Montreal during his visits to this continent, fought as Bert Harris in Canada some years ago. He is British lightweight champion and a former Canadian titleholder. The fight last night at London was his first ring appearance since February 20, Foreman having been seriously ill with a stomach ailment during the summer. He began training about six weeks ago and his first re-appearance in the ring was watched with interest by his Canadian supporters. Foreman is considered the hardest puncher in the lightweight division and, according to his brother and manager, Harry Foreman, is aiming at a title fight with Tony Canzoneri in December either in London or New York.

**MR. JAMES CRASWELL**

Mr. James A. Craswell died in Boston, Mass., Oct. 26. He was born in Rustico, P. E. I., Nov. 8, 1873, being the youngest son of Charles and Ann (Bullman) Craswell. He spent his youth in his native town, coming to Boston at the age of eighteen. He engaged in various businesses as a salesman, continuing in this line of work to within 5 years of his death. In Boston he lived at the home of his sister, Frances by whom he was faithfully nursed throughout a long sickness. The end was caused by heart failure induced by a four years illness. He is survived by one brother and three sisters, Adam Craswell, Rustico, P. E. I., Adeline Craswell, Mayfield, P. E. I., Frances Craswell, Boston, Mass., and Mrs. Annie C. Wait, West, Acton, Mass. Interment was made in St. Mark's Cemetery, Rustico.

**FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER**

TORONTO, Ont., Nov. 2.—(By The Canadian Press) The latest chapter in the varied sporting story of Lionel Conacher's life will have the wrestling mat as a background.

Announcement that the "big train" had signed his name to a three-year professional wrestling contract was made here last night. He will go into training immediately.

Conacher has blazoned his name in sporting headlines for many years. As a rugby player he probably reached the peak of his popularity but his muscular bulk has also cut a large figure in ice hockey lacrosse and baseball as well as in amateur boxing and wrestling.

A half a decade ago Conacher won the amateur heavyweight boxing and wrestling championship of Canada the same year.

**Two Years For De-frauding**

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 30.—Convicted of defrauding a local group of Chinese to the extent of \$10,000 on the pretext she could evade immigration regulations by bringing natives of China into Canada and registering them as students of the physical culture department at McGill University, Mrs. Julia Clarissa Delahunt, local employment agency operator, today was sentenced by Judge Lacroix in the Court of Sessions, to serve a penitentiary term of two years.

**New Liner For Bermuda**

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 30.—Officials of the Furness-Bermuda line announced yesterday that their new \$8,000,000 flagship, Monarch of Bermuda, would undergo her official sea trials off England today, and would be delivered to them in ample time to sail from New York on November 28th on her initial voyage to Bermuda.

The steamer was designed especially for the New York-Bermuda trade. She is a quadruple-screw vessel of 27,770 tons displacement and 23,000 tons gross.
