

of insect forms is the hobby of Professor C. A. Mail, former graduate of the University of Alberta.

Native to glacial areas, the bug is one insect that has undergone no revolutionary changes since dinosaurs roamed the earth in the early part of the Ice Age, 100,000,000 years ago.

The professor has 68 of the scientifically known grychatta which feed on house flies. They are cannibalistic when hungry, flee from light and are difficult to photograph.

The bugs were first discovered at Banff, in Alberta, by Professor E. M. Walker of the University of Toronto.

McPherson Suit Involves Name Of A Governor

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 1—Two women evangelists—Almee Semple McPherson and Rhea Crawford Spivack, one time "Angel of Broadway"—marshaled forces recently to wage a million-dollar battle around a charge of slander.

Miss Crawford, associate pastor of Angeles Temple, filed a \$1,080,000 slander suit recently against Mrs. McPherson with the declaration, "I want the whole thing to come out without any ambiguities whatever."

Giles Knight, business manager for Mrs. McPherson, countered: "We may have a million dollars, but she won't get a cent of it."

"High Official"? Governor!

Miss Crawford asserted her determination to conceal nothing when she announced that with her own pen she had changed a paragraph in the complaint, striking out the words "a high state official" to make the quotation she charged as emanating from sister Almee read:

"She may have been good enough to have been a Governor's mistress, but no woman of her kind is going to use my platform, use my money and wreck my temple and get away with it."

"That's an old story that's been floating around for a long time," Miss Crawford said. "Now I want the whole thing to come out, without any ambiguities whatsoever."

Other slanderous things she accused Mrs. McPherson of saying about her involved the use of the phrases, "Jezebel," "embezzled" and "once a crook, always a crook."

A quotation attributed to the pastor of Angeles Temple was: "A certain person embezzled plenty of money from the temple when I was away, and so did Rhea. She is playing the same game. Talk about Capone or Dillinger, Miss Crawford is as bad as either one. She has a gang in her temple here equal to either of theirs."
