USING UP THE LEFT OVERS.

The size of the household bill depends very largely upon the manner in which "left-overs" are used up. Of course if odd bits of vegetables, meats, cheese, fish and so on are thrown away and no use made of them the food bill will mount much higher than if care is taken, as it is in a great many homes, and every bit is used up.

PIECES OF CHEESE.

Take any piece of cheese, cream or otherwise, that there may be, cut off the rind, put through a sharp mincer, and then pound with a little margarine or butter, pepper, salt and cayenne. Place in a tureen and run a little melted butter over. Serve with crisp toast for luncheon.

POTTED MEAT OR FISH.

When there are various odds and ends of cooked meat, such as a cutlet, a small piece of steak, half a chicken leg, etc., remove all skin and bone, mince very finely, add pepper and salt, and pound with a little butter. Press into a tureen and cover with a little liquid, butter. When there are remains of fish to use proceed in the same way.

THE REMAINS OF A CURRY.

Mince finely, mix with rice, and reserve as patties in pastry cases or as devilled pasties. For these have rounds of puff or short pastry ready. Place a little curry on one side of each, wet the edges, fold over and press together, brush over with egg and bake. Serve hot.

STUFFED POTATOES.

Take baked potatoes all of a size and cut off a piece lengthwise. Remove some of the potato and fill with the curry mixture. Make very hot and serve. Use the potato you remove for mashed or leather potato, or mix with salt, pepper and finely chopped cooked cabbage, form into cake, and bake or fry, and serve with bacon for breakfast.

DEVILLED CROUTONS.

For these have hollowed out croutons of fried bread. Mince and curry finely and pile it up in the cases. Make very hot and serve. Do not mix in the rice in this case, but use that to add to some buttered egg to form rice and buttered egg, which makes a nice breakfast dish spread on toast.

FASHION DECREES PLAITS.

To take some of the new models recently seen, one suit with a hip-length coat having an oblong opening in front, is completed by a straight skirt laid entirely in four inch box plaits that have only an inch spacing between. Another suit has an almost knee length coat, belted in with a narrow strap at the waist. The coat is laid in four inch box plaits, two at the front and two at the back. 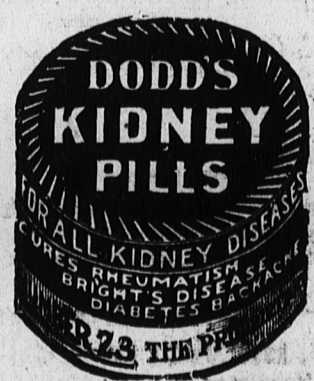
There is a hinterland they say For all who would explore And though the dawn be dark and grey There is a Guiding Star. And though the road may rocky be That's where the glories are.
