FARM PRODUCTS OF CANADA 1921

According to the reports of crop correspondents to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, the average yields per acre, as compared with those of 1920, given in brackets, are in bushels as follows: Wheat 114 (114); oats 30 (32); barley 23 (21); rye 11 (11); peas 16 (19); beans 15 (17); buck 18 (18); mixed grains 25 (25); (10); corn for husking 48 (49); potatoes 158 (170); turnips, etc. 620 (610). Tons: Hay and clover 544 (544); sugar beets 830 (830); mixed 850,000 bushels, against last year's record of 1,338,100 bushels. The yield per acre this year is 1.68 bushels, as against 1.70; bushels last year and 1.74 bushels, the average for the ten years 1911-20. By provinces, the average yield per acre is highest in New Brunswick with 2.14 bushels, as compared with 1.98 bushels last year, and 1.83 bushels the decennial average. The provinces reported 1911-20: corn for husking 48 (49); potatoes 158 (170); turnips, etc. 620 (610). Tons: Hay and clover 544 (544); sugar beets 830 (830); mixed 850,000 bushels, against last year's record of 1,338,100 bushels.
