MUST ACT TOGETHER.

The Pioneer calls for the formation of a board of trade in that flourishing town. The call is founded on sound business principles. No town of the size and commercial importance of Summerside can afford to be without an organization in which its merchants and manufacturers can take counsel together for their mutual interest and the general good, and which can give formal expression to their wishes and feelings in matters of public concern. But we do not share the Pioneer's view that there is any desire on the part of the Board of Trade in this city to sacrifice the interests of Summerside, or take any advantage in regard to the mails or general traffic. No trade organization in Summerside could probably have prevented the change made in the mail arrangements, but whether that be so or not, the Pioneer ought to be aware that Charlottetown would have been well content for the mails to have continued to pass by way of the western port provided that late mails could have been obtained in that way as in the summer time.

By all means let the western capital organise a board of trade, and we shall hope it may prove as useful and influential a body as our own board. But let there be no hostility or conflict of action between the east and west that can be avoided. Our insular community is a small one and will always find it hard enough to secure full justice for the Island in those affairs that are governed by the federal power. We must act together if we are to succeed. With a board of trade in Summerside we shall be in a better position to exchange views from time to time and in that way united and harmonious action can be secured. In this way by comparing notes and a spirit of fairness and mutual concession on the best interests of both towns will be best served. We want no St. John and Halifax squabble between Summerside and Charlottetown.

That was an excellent offer of Hon. D. Farquharson to be one of ten who would give \$100 each towards the library fund. But where are the nine? THE GUARDIAN has excellent space in which to place their names, either one at a time or all together, where all the people would read and admire them. Who will speak first?

There has been a good deal of objection in the opposition press to the admission of Gallician immigrants to Canada. The objection has broken out afresh with the report that a Gallician woman has already murdered her husband in the North West. But as the woman has been reported "probably insane," and as at least two Canadian women have been convicted of murder within the past year, without any such defence, it seems unfair to make much of the murder incident. The one greatest want of Canada is more people, and if the Gallicians are not of the most respectable class we may hope they will rapidly improve under Canadian institutions. Objections were urged against the bringing in of the Menonites under the late government, but they have proved a most industrious and law-abiding people.

Judge Pryor, who tries divorce suits in New York, remarked the other day that he has noticed that domestic disagreements are most frequent in early married life. "With time," he says, "the yoke wears easier and the true honeymoon he finds anywhere from the twenty-fifth to the fiftieth year after marriage." This is encouraging to all those recent benighted who have not yet celebrated their silver weddings.

In the ordinary course of events the governorship of this province may fall vacant during the coming winter. After a change of government it is quite usual that appointments made by the outgoing party are pretty generally allowed to terminate as soon as the law permits, and the governorship is one of the best plums in the gift of the Ottawa government. Already there is frequent mention of names, and there is naturally a good deal of interest to know who the next occupant of Government House will be. Among those whose names rumor mentions with most frequency in this connection are Hon Daniel Davies, Hon B. Rogers and Commodore Welsh. And there are others.

The recent charge of the Archbishop of Canterbury has apparently increased rather than diminished the differences in the Anglican communion which it was intended to harmonise. The Archbishop admits that the Church of England has condemned the Roman doctrine of transubstantiation, but he declares it is not unlawful to hold and teach the doctrine of consubstantiation. This is retaining the doctrine of the "real presence" with only a difference of the mode. The objection of the reformed Protestant churches includes both the modes of substantiation. The doctrine of the real presence is Romish, and cannot be made acceptable to Protestants by even the endorsement of the Primate.

The sinking of the raised Spanish cruiser Maria Christina is the last chapter in the history of that unfortunate ship. The cruiser was named in honor of the younger princess of the royal family of Spain. She was disabled and sunk in the battle at Santiago, 3rd July last, and was since raised under direction of Lieut. Hobson of the United States navy. It was intended to have added her to the navy of the victorious Republic, but that intention has been frustrated—it may be "least they forget," as Kipling would say. As the cruiser now lies two hundred fathoms deep there will be no further attempt to bring her to the surface. Those who may think it an ill omen that such a fate should befall a war vessel bearing a royal name may be reminded of the sinking of the British battleship Victoria, off the coast of Syria in June, 1893.

A Polish mathematician has discovered a new way of teaching the multiplication table, from six times upward. He numbers the thumbs and fingers of each hand from six to ten, the thumbs being 6 and the little fingers 10. In order to multiply any two numbers the fingers representing the multiplier and the multiplicand are placed together. Then by adding together the fingers that are thus touching and those that are above them, you get the number of tens in the answer. The fingers below the two that are joined, when multiplied, give the units. To multiply 8 by 9 for instance: Place the middle finger of the right hand against the ring finger of the left. These and the fingers above them number seven in all. Seven tens are seventy. There still remain two fingers on the right hand and one on the left. Multiply these together and the product is 2. Add this product to the 70 before obtained and you have 72, the answer required. This is so much easier than committing to memory the words "Nine times eight are seventy-two!"
