the only fair method.

HON. MR. RICHARDS thought that in large manufacturing centres where there was a numerous employed class the ballot might be useful. Here we had few of this class. Our electors were mainly independent, and they had not asked for the ballot. He had no prejudice against the ballot or in favor of open voting. If he thought the people wanted the ballot he would not oppose it.

MR. COX had heard no particular demand for the ballot, but was not opposed to it. The matter would not doubt come up again and could be decided then.

HON. MR. HUGHES thought it a reflection upon the electors of Charlottetown to say they were afraid or ashamed to vote their honest convictions.

The resolution was lost on a party vote of 13 to 10.

MR. McLEAN moved a lengthy resolution condemning the Government for its dilatory and ineffective action in regard to our claims against the Dominion Government. It set forth that the House in 1907 resolved that a special committee be appointed to prepare a complete and accurate statement of our claims; that no action was taken thereon for a year; that at the close of the session of 1909 the Premier said the committee had not completed their work, and

that nothing practical had since been done to secure payment. He supported the resolution in a brief address.

MR. A. J. McDonald briefly supported the resolution. THE PREMIER defended the action of the government. Resolutions and memorials could do little good. He did not believe in fooling the country into a belief that there was any immediate prospect of recovering these claims. No other Province in the Dominion. If we are to claim on the ground of the territory to be allotted to Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec, which he thought we might when the territory is transferred, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick would have equally good claims and the Maritime Provinces should act together. The time was not yet ripe for this, however. The fishery claim had been pressed by this Government and by former Governments. They could not take the Dominion Government by the throat and compel them to pay. When it is collected it will be by joint action of the three Maritime Provinces. Nova Scotia is content with things as they are and New Brunswick has not moved. As to the railway claim, no member of the Ottawa cabinet took much stock in it.

MR. MATHIESON said the Premier had belittled our claims and treated them merely as political stalking horses. The country took this matter more seriously. They are an intelligent people and they are not content with these claims by the Government without showing of its strength at the last election. Outside of Charlottetown the country divided evenly between the parties. The Premier had gone to Ottawa to push these claims and had come back concluding that we had no claims that are any good. No one of our claims had been properly prepared and formulated. He argued that our claim on railway account would be irresistible if properly stated, and every member of the Government at Ottawa would be forced to consider it. Our fishery claim is unique, because it arose before confederation, but nothing has been done about it. The Premier had not tried; he did not believe in our claims. The Sullivan Government prepared a complete brief, carried it to Ottawa and thence to the foot of the throne and recovered \$20,000 a year. How had Manitoba gained increased subsidies, allowance for lands and for Government buildings, except by pressing for them? We are contributing five or six hundred thousand dollars a year more to the Dominion than we are getting back and this loss is increasing from year to year. Our claim to a share in the western lands should be asserted before the lands are given away to the central Provinces. Already those Provinces have been doubled in size, while we got nothing in return. Had the Premier told the people at the last election that our claims were to be abandoned and \$20,000 more taxes laid on the farmers, he would have been swept from power and few of his supporters would now have seats in the Legislature.

HON. MR. HUGHES replied in defence of the Government, speaking till nearly 9 o'clock when Mr. Laird took the floor.

EVENING SESSION. MR. LAIRD resumed his speech on the claims resolution. Among other points made was that the Liberal had given the Island four different winter steamers, while the Conservative had provided but one, The Earl Grey, he claimed, was worth two of the Stanley. We had almost continuous communication during the past winter, but might be blocked by the ice in future years. In that case we ought to get the Tunnel, to which the Island is well entitled. He reviewed the history of the various claims and contrasted the policy of both parties from confederation down, showing in his remarks strong preference for the Liberal party. He was loudly cheered by the Opposition in an ironical way.

The resolution was then voted down by a party vote, 12 to 10. HON. MR. McMILLAN, seconded by Mr. Crosby, moved a resolution setting forth the claims of North River for a shipping wharf at the end of the Ferry Road and recommended that the Dominion Minister of Public Works be requested to have it built. He supported the resolution by a strong practical speech setting forth that the people of that section paid taxes and had no share in the railway accommodation furnished to other sections.

MR. CROSBY said the wharf was very much needed, and was followed by Mr. Laird in support of the resolution.

MR. McKINNON praised the section of the country concerned, and thought its claims should receive attention along with other neglected portions of the country, some of them in King's County, which he moved to include in the resolution, so as to provide some fair accommodation between Cape Barr and Wood Islands.

The discussion was continued by Mr. Palmer and Hon. Mr. McInnis, who objected to coupling the two propositions together. Hon. Mr. Comstock strongly favored the resolution but thought it ought not to be overloaded with too many other projects. Hon. L. McDonald, Mr. Cox, and Hon. Mr. Hughes. The House divided on the amendment, which was declared lost 13 to 11. The original resolution was adopted.

THE PREMIER moved a resolution affirming the principle that by representation of a Province in the House of Commons should not in any case be reduced below the number with which it entered the union. He discussed the representation question at some length, pointing to the danger of further loss. Similar resolutions had been adopted by New Brunswick and Nova Scotia and it was hoped that Quebec would join in support of the principle.

MR. MATHIESON seconded the resolution, which was adopted unanimously.

MR. CROSBY, seconded by Mr. Cox moved the usual resolution of thanks to His Honor, the Lieutenant Governor.

The House in committee, Dr. Warburton in the chair, took up the usual vote of \$3,000 for paupers. Mr. Mathieson, Mr. Palmer and others criticised the plan of distribution as unsatisfactory.

The matter was further discussed by Hon. Mr. Hughes, Mr. Laird, Mr. Wyatt and Mr. Crosby, when the item was passed. THE PREMIER called attention to the conference between the Dominion Government and the Governments of the Provinces as to their respective jurisdictions, which had resulted in nothing being done. This Province had not suffered in not being represented there. In reply to Mr. Mathieson, he said he hoped to have printed copies of the Education Commission's report for distribution tomorrow.

MR. PALMER submitted the report of the Public Accounts Committee, which was adopted.

The House adjourned before eleven o'clock till 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

TALK OF RAISING RAILWAY RATES.

LONDON, April 6.—According to local railroad officials, there is a move on foot for both the C. P. R. and G. T. R. to raise passenger and freight rates, which they claim to be necessary on account of repeated demands of employees for more wages. The Grand Trunk officials, say that the New York Central are contemplating raising the rate to five cents a mile, and that other lines have already raised rates.
