dition. What is the cause of this peculiar action? Should the battery be firm in its case? Mine is under the car and shifts about somewhat in its box.

ANSWER: Quite likely, when the battery joggles in its case, as the car strikes a bump, one of its cable connections loses contact, which interrupts the charging current from the generator momentarily. The load thus being removed from the generator causes its voltage to build up abnormally and causes the lights to flare up. You better clean and tighten the battery cable connections and lose no time in wedging your battery tight in its case, with strips of wood or something of the kind, for if it is allowed to shift, in this way, it will not last long.

ALARMING INCREASE CATTLE TUBERCULOSIS

PETROLEA, Ont., Feb. 14.—The alarming increase of tuberculosis in cattle throughout Canada, particularly Ontario, was asserted to be one of the most important questions in live stock industry, by W. R. Reek, assistant live stock commissioner of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, who addressed 200 farmers here this at a banquet given by the Lambton County Corn Growers' Association.

Mr. Reek stated that 25.2 per cent of the hog shipped to Toronto abattoirs last year from Kent county alone, were diseased with tuberculosis, and that Lambton county followed very closely with a large percentage. He attributed this increase of tuberculosis in hogs to the diseased stocks of cows, and appealed to farmers to do everything in their power to combat the disease.

During the course of his remarks, Mr. Reek spoke of present market conditions of the livestock industry. He said that it was impossible to forecast the outcome of the present price situation, remarking that the outlook for better prices was very uncertain. He attributed the present slump in prices to the restricted export outlook and public sentiment against high prices, together with a few minor issues.

In urging the farmers to produce higher grade stock, Mr. Reek asserted that unless they do so the Argentine Republic, which is Canada's close competitor in exporting livestock, will step in and secure the bulk of Canada's present trade.

NOTES ON THE EGG LAYING CONTEST.

The Charlottetown Egg Laying Contest made gains during the past week, notwithstanding the stormy weather. The total number of eggs for the week was 450, or a gain of 86 eggs over the preceding week. There were 10 hens in each pen, or a total of 250 birds. There are 21 more hens laying this week than last, the total being 139, or 55 per cent of the hens in the contest. There was a slight gain in the production of individual hens, as birds laid 6 eggs each during the week. 15 hens laid 5 eggs, 33 hens laid 4 eggs, and 35 hens laid 3 eggs each. The pen of White Wyandottes owned by Mrs. J. J. McLellan, Grand River, has first place for the week, with 36 eggs. This pen also has the highest record for an individual hen to date; hen No. C-119 having laid 55 eggs to date. The pen of White Leghorns, No. 21, owned by the Experimental Station, was 2nd for the week, with 34 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns owned by James J. Jenkins, Orwell Cove, was 3rd, with 33 eggs; the pen of Barred Rocks No. 25, owned by the Experimental Station, tied for 3rd place, with 33 eggs each; the pen of Barred Rocks owned by James Cain of New Perth was 4th, with 30 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns owned by Mrs. R. W. Bulphitt of Cardigan, was 5th, with 29 eggs, and the pen of Barred Rocks of J. B. Millman of Kensington, was 6th, with 27 eggs. The Experimental Farm's pen of Barred Rocks, No. 25, leads the contest with 316 eggs; the pen of Barred Rocks of H. L. Machon, Murray Harbour, is 2nd, with 284 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns, No. 21, owned by the Experimental Station, is 3rd, with 238 eggs; Mr. James J. Jenkins' pen of White Leghorns is 4th, with 218 eggs; the pen of Barred Rocks owned by Mr. J. B. Millman of Kensington, is 5th, with 204 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns owned by William Neale of Bear River, is 6th, with 195 eggs; the pen of White Leghorns owned by Edwin Reid of Hullo Bay, is 7th, with 138 eggs; and the pen of Barred Rocks of Mrs. R. G. McLaren of New Perth, is 8th, with 185 eggs. The total number of eggs laid to date is 8,455. There is only one hen in the contest at present moulted.

Progress At The Technical School

Classes at the Provincial Agricultural and Technical School are continuing this month with a slight falling off on account of sickness. The total enrolment to date is 115, of which 31 are day-class students. The average attendance of day students varies from 18 to 25. The course, which began in November, will continue until about the middle of April. The day classes are devoted more particularly to agricultural subjects and the students with two or three exceptions are from rural districts. Twenty of the day students are from Queen's County, eight from Prince and three from King's.

A feature of the course at present is the series of lectures by Mr. Fraser T. Morrow on dairying, each student being given an opportunity of conducting individual milk and cream tests. A DeLeval milking machine has been set up and demonstrations will be given shortly by the local representative of the De Leval Company, Mr. J. D. O'Leary. Lectures on poultry are being given by Mr. Cyrus Polier.

Special subjects are being taken up in the night classes. The wireless course, under the tutorage of Mr. Keith Rogers, promises to be a popular one. The full transmitting and receiving apparatus has been installed and set up and is the most powerful on the Island.

The motor mechanics course, conducted by Mr. Harry Whitlock, runs two nights a week and has an encouraging average attendance of twenty-five.

Next week a class in blacksmithing will be started for night students, and will be open both to those attending the regular course and to any student from the city wishing to attend. Portable forges are being installed and the class will be under the capable instruction of Mr. Samuel Campbell, foreman of the blacksmithing department at Bruce Stewart & Company.

Other plans for night courses in technical subjects are being made, which will include architectural and machine-shop drawing. These, however, are not yet definitely decided upon.

THE MARKETS

MONTREAL, Feb. 12.—The undertone to the local market for eggs today was weaker and prices scored a further decline of 2c a dozen owing to the liberal receipts and the accumulation of stocks on spot on account of the somewhat limited demand, and sales of new laid stock were made at 58c per dozen. The receipts today were 1,121 cases, as compared with 555 for the same day last week, and 199 for the corresponding day a year ago.

Owing to the continued light receipts of fresh-killed dressed poultry, and the steadily increasing demand for storage stock, a stronger feeling has developed in the market for some lines and prices for choice turkeys have advanced 2c per lb with sales at 80c to 85c while good stock brings 55c to 57c, and ducks are 1c to 2c per lb, high at 40c to 41c, with milk-fed chickens selling at 42c to 44c.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows:
Turkeys, choice 60c to 62c
Good turkeys 55c to 57c
Geese 30c to 35c
Chickens 40c to 42c
Ducks 40c to 41c
Fowls 38c to 39c King's.

A weaker feeling developed in the market for potatoes today and prices scored a decline of 5c to 10c per bag, but even at the lower level of buyers were not disposed to operate and trade was quiet, with car lots of Green Mountains and Quebec stock quoted at 95c to \$1. per bag of 90 lbs. ex-track. On the other hand, there was a fair demand for small lots, and in a jobbing way prices were unchanged at \$1.25 to \$1.40 per bag of 80 lbs. ex-track.


