### THE COMING ELECTIONS.

Though the time between the dissolution and the coming elections is short we have not noticed that the Opposition press has made any complaint on that score. The fact is that the elections had been expected this fall, and both parties had prepared accordingly. The grounds upon which the respective party leaders are making their appeal to the electorate have been for a good while before the country.

Western papers remark upon the considerable apathy existing in the public mind, but this may be, and probably is, more apparent than real. The same apathy was spoken of in the British papers on the eve of the election in the United Kingdom, but the elections show that the electors have by no means lost their interest in public affairs. On the contrary they are crowding to the polls in large numbers and recording their votes in great volume, rolling up an almost unprecedented majority for the party in power.

It may be said that the political quiet in the United Kingdom just before the election arose from the general impression that the Salisbury Government would be sustained, and this is no doubt partly true. Whether or not alike cause may be behind the reported apathy in the Canadian electorate would be a matter upon which the party leaders would not agree. None the less we anticipate that the campaign now beginning will rapidly grow in interest, and that at the close a very large vote will be polled. We trust that this may prove true. An alert interest in our public affairs, and a careful scrutiny of the acts of our public men affords an evidence of healthful public sentiment.

The Parliament which Canada is about to elect will have most important duties and responsibilities resting upon it. It will control the destinies of Canada during the opening years of the twentieth century, and will have much to do in ordering our future relations with the Mother Country and the Great Republic beside us. It will have to do with the agricultural, industrial, commercial and mining interests of a Dominion greatly increased in wealth, in population, in power and importance. The elector who at such a time and under such conditions refuses or neglects to poll his vote will show a sad want of patriotic interest in his country.

It is quite impossible for those who live where the fields are watered by the clouds, as in Prince Edward Island, to realize what has been done by irrigation in various sections of the United States. It means that from \$100,000,000 to twice that sum has been expended in digging ditches and canals for irrigation. It means that an area of wholly barren land, equal in extent to the entire State of New York, has been reclaimed and made productive, and much of it remarkably so. Indeed so great is the productivity of the irrigated lands in Utah that 20 acres has become the average size of a farm. This supports a farmer and his family in greater comfort than an entire township of the same land would do without irrigation. The results of irrigation in Utah, California, Arizona and other states reads like a romance.

It is unfortunate for the Republican campaign that so near the day of voting the most severe reverse of this year in the Philippines should have occurred. Gen. Another untoward event is also chronicled—the torturing of native prisoners, for which two American officers were found guilty by court-martial. Gen. McArthur characterizes their offense as "an assault not only criminal in its effect, under the laws of war, but in remote consequences well calculated to inflict permanent injury upon the nation."

NEW YORK, Oct. 9.—New world's record for putting the 12 and 16 pound shots made by Dennis Horgan for the benefit of the game held to-day under the auspices of Pastime A. C. at its grounds. Horgan put the 12 pound shot 55 feet 9 1/2 inches, or 9 1/2 in. further than any athlete in the world has ever done before. In putting the 16 pound shot Horgan added half an inch to his own world's record of 48 feet 2 inches.
