fires. Speeches were made by Messrs. the Mayor, Mr. Frank Solomon explaining the fire-fighting system of Pictou. It could easily be installed in Georgetown. The method was to have an electric pump placed on King's wharf and with sufficient hose the town

could be effectively covered. Mr. Solomon was able to give very definite information at this meeting, but said he could secure it in the course of a week. Mr. S. C. Knight, who has been fire marshal for Dawson City, Yukon, outlined the system of fire fighting used in that city. He supported the idea of a chemical engine when the fire could be reached at an early stage but once it got

inside he said his experience proved it absolutely useless. The other method was a steamer when the water could be brought to play upon the building in about two minutes, as on the other hand it would take about fifteen minutes to set up steam with cold water. On motion the Council was authorized to secure all the information possible with regard to fire-fighting apparatus.
