There will be a public missionary meeting held in the Hazelbrook Baptist Church next Friday evening at 7.30 o'clock. The meeting will be addressed by Miss Flora Clark returned missionary, Miss A. A. Wadman provincial sec'y of the W.M.A.S. for P. E. Island and other prominent workers.

Three delegates from this city have returned from attending the fourth convention of the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees, which was held at Quebec, Oct. 17, 18 and 19, and was very largely attended, there being about 4,000 delegates present. The convention opened at 2 p. m. on Tuesday, Oct. 17, in the parliament buildings. Several important resolutions were passed among which was one that a donation be made to the McNamara defence fund, and it was left to the executive committee to determine the amount and make arrangements for raising it. Another resolution adopted was that the promoter of New Brunswick be memorialized to ask the government to appoint a commissioner of labor, with a labor bureau attached, to assist in harmonizing the interests of capital and labor. A committee of three was appointed to lay the matter before the department of labor at Ottawa. There was also brought up for consideration the advisability of extending the Industrial Disputes Act to the government system of railways, and the discussion of certain changes in the act. A committee was appointed to study the matter. The suggestion was made that the headquarters of the brotherhood should be moved to Ottawa. It was determined to commence a campaign of organization to extend the brotherhood to all the western roads. It was announced that the next session would be held in 1913 at Ottawa.

Complaints have been heard recently as to the inability of shippers to secure box cars within a reasonable time from the P. E. I. R. for shipping purposes. It is learned from the railway authorities that this condition of affairs which has existed to a certain extent during the past week or so in the usual autumn shipping rush, is not the fault of the railway officials—in fact the blame can rest on certain of the shippers. This is explained by the statement that during the rush shippers have held cars entirely beyond a reasonable time both for loading and unloading, during nearly all of which time the railway has been earning a revenue for the haul and at the same time relieving the shipping situation. One case is known of cars being held by a shipper eighteen days when three or four at the outside should have been sufficient. Other instances showing an undue tardiness on the part of shippers could be quoted, all of which would go to show that while the railway is being condemned for not having enough cars to handle a big rush provided those engaging the cars load and unload promptly. They do not ask for any great exertion in this respect—if the shippers prevent any delay on their part and co-operate with the road in the effort to supply cars as required they will find little reason to complain of a shortage of cars.

And this, then, is a little talk about better Wall Decorations

COLORS in all fabrics have of late years shown a marked tendency toward improvement—soft mezza tints having found, it seems, a permanent place in popular fancy. Wall papers nowadays are real dreams of art, designed by true artists, with the proper feeling for tone and right ideas of decoration.

Every period, clime and decorative school is ransacked for worthy inspirations and examples, while much that is distinctly new and original is also offered.

The use of paper and draperies which match, or at least are designed for use together, is a noticeable feature of present day modes in wall treatment. Panelling is another of the distinct characteristics of fashionable wall decoration, very narrow borders being used to outline these panels.

Where a scheme of period decoration is attempted, the wall papers and draperies are all important factors in carrying it to completion.

When a number of pictures are to be hung in a room, a plain and unobtrusive wall paper should be selected and fancy effects in applying it tabooed. Pictures hung upon a panelled wall must be very carefully arranged, with due regard to the panelling.

Plain or striped papers are sometimes carried to the ceiling, with a tiny border at the top, and another two or three feet below marking the top of the panels. These borders are usually of the wreath or garland design, cut out along the lower edge, with the background of plain cream or the tone of the side wall paper along the upper edge.

Absolutely plain walls, with drop ceilings, in lighter shades are always in unassailable good taste, and a safe choice in a small room or one well filled with furniture, bric-a-brac or pictures.

These are just a few hints as to methods you can use in the rooms you wish to have done this autumn.

Now just note—the papers for any idea above can be supplied right here—or at the most ten days notice will be enough to secure the more elaborate ideas.
