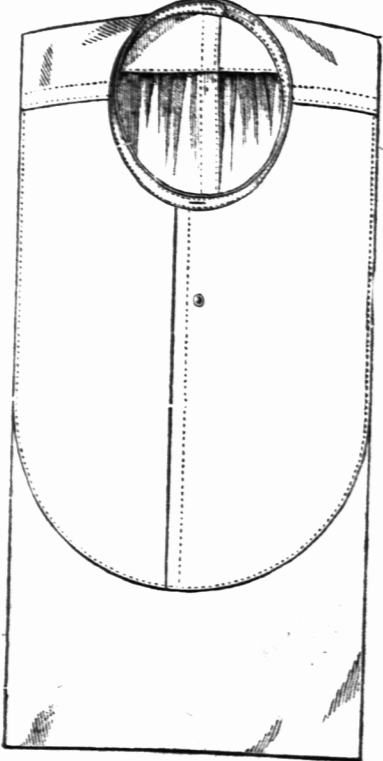

Latest News of the City and Province.

CHURCH SERVICE—The Rev. F. A. MacMillan will hold service and preach in Christ Church, Cherry Valley, on Sunday, Aug. 20th, at 11 a. m.

THE Methodist Sunday school of the Margate Circuit intend holding their annual picnic on Wednesday, Aug. 23rd, at Kensington. A table will be provided for visitors. All are cordially invited. Proceeds in aid of the Kensington S. S. Library.

THE building committee in connection with the Presbyterian church at Cavendish, have called for tenders for a new church. The committee are to be commended for the rapidity with which they have performed the duties devolving on such committees.

THE market received a poor attendance yesterday. Almost everything offered was disposed of early in the day. Butter sold from 15 to 17 cents. Eggs, 18 to 14c; blueberries, 4c qt; raspberries, 8 and 9c qt; black currants were sold at 8c qt. Cherries were a luxury and sold for 20c a quart. Potatoes 40c a bushel.

MONDAY afternoon quite an interesting scene occurred on the corner of one of our principal streets. A woman was endeavoring to persuade her husband to go home with her. The man was more under a foreign influence than a local one. After some persuasive advice, he decided to go with his wife. A third party interferred and submitted some advice, but the lady quickly despatched him by dealing him a sharp blow on the face. Then the husband escorted by his wife went peacefully to their home.

The Maritime Synod of the Presbyterian Church meets in the First Presbyterian church Truro, in October. This church has now a history of 127 years, and during that time has only had five pastors. In Truro, the first Presbyterian in the Dominion of Canada was formed. Hence synod meets on historic ground and with a congregation that has a unique history. The General Assembly next June meets in St. Matthew's church, Halifax, with the oldest congregation in the Dominion. The Assembly there will very appropriately celebrate its semi-jubilee within the walls of St. Matthew's in Halifax, in 1770, a Presbyterian church was formed, consisting of two Presbyterians and two Congregationalist ministers, who ordained Mr. R. B. Comings, to labor at Lunenburg. This was the first ordination in the Dominion.

CAVENDISH NOTES.—Haying is about finished and although the crop is not so large as that of last year it is of a much better quality. Our school opened on 14th inst; the trustees have secured the service of Miss Nellie MacNeil as teacher for the coming year and it is predicted that our school will regain its former elevated position under Miss MacNeil's careful management.—The grain and root crops in this section are looking excellent and our farmers are anticipating an abundant harvest.—Central Division No 185, holds regular fortnightly meetings and is slowly but surely pushing its way forward under the guidance of our W. P. Miss L. M. Montgomery.—Cavendish is becoming famous as a summer resort. Quite a number of Charlottetownians have been spending their holidays with us. Professor Hawley and party returned to the city on 10th inst, after spending a delightful week "camping out."—Miss Maggie Campbell of Charlottetown is spending her holidays with friends at Cavendish.—One of our local tradesmen was heard murmuring a few evenings ago that "he found himself in a terrible predicament" owing to his having called at one of our local stores and not receiving what he asked for purchased a quantity of that noxious weed known as tobacco, after having given a pledge that he would not use anything of the kind for a number of years. We hope our friend will not be caught in a similar case the second time.—The C. G. Club holds stated meetings and rumor has it that they are preparing for a mass meeting in the near future.
