**A TAXI'S COMPLAINT**

Sir:—Will you permit me to protest against the persecution that is being carried on against legitimate motorists, under the color of law, and which, as it appears to very many, was correctly described by counsel in a case before the court, as reduced to a "burlesque."

Relying upon the assurance given me by an authorized traffic officer, the speed limit would not be enforced against taxi drivers meeting the early morning or late Borden trains, I relaxed my vigilance upon my employees in respect to mileage, but insisting, as is my custom on cautious and expert driving. I was too innocently confiding to ask for the above assurance in writing.

Last week I received three summonses for three drivers of my cars and two not yet served, a total of five, for what at best were trifling and technical breaches of the speed limit. I complained to this official that they had cancelled the regulation and are enforcing the law more stringently. My complaint is that he should have notified me of that change, which he did not do. And if a court action was necessary, one warning summons would have served every interest of justice and an avalanche of five actions under such circumstances, was indefensible.

As I had no reason, from my observation of the treatment of others to expect fair consideration, the amounts demanded were paid without contesting them.

The question now is: Must the taxi service, in as far as it applies within city limits, be wiped out? Must the early morning traveller, anxious and with a very short time at his disposal, and upon urgent or perhaps life and death business, be compelled to crawl over empty streets at fifteen miles an hour and with a certainty of missing the outgoing morning train, which never waits for emergency passengers?

Are taxi and private drivers, answering emergency calls to meet almost midnight trains, arriving at uncertain hours, to be tied up upon streets that at that time are bare of traffic, and incoming passengers to be compelled to travel on foot, loaded with heavy baggage, to the TAKE 2 TAXIS COMPLAINT. . . . distant and extreme ends of the city? Is the expectant child, which surely has the right to be born under skillful hospital care, to be, under the force of these arbitrary regulations, ushered into life on an auto seat. Must the invalid under sudden and serious attack, trying to reach a doctor, a home or a hospital, be up against perhaps fatal ending, because the taxi he called dare not hastily convey him to safety and care?

It is cases of this nature that constitute the bulk of the city taxi service. If this is to be cut out by the order and execution of such barbarous and drastic edicts, then the taxi cars must of necessity be reduced to the number required for the more limited tourist and country calls. Taxi drivers cannot afford the cost of city service which is hampered and practically prohibited by an unreasonable and I may claim unlawful interpretation of our Motor Vehicle Act.

Taxi drivers, with very rare exceptions, are skilled and careful in car operations. The very nature of their employment compels them to be so. If they were in the slightest degree reckless, careless or incompetent, an exacting travelling public would quickly put their patronage to an end. And if they were not, it would be the duty of law officers, in their cases more than in that of ordinary drivers, in the interest of public safety, to quickly penalize them. But this necessity is no justification for frivolous and unfair persecution.

**SPECIAL AIR FLIGHTS.**—The Post Office Department have issued notices with regard to two special AIR MAIL FLIGHTS that will be undertaken on the 24th inst. One flight will be from Windsor to the Canadian National Exhibition Grounds at Toronto and will be made via London and Hamilton Ont. The second flight is from Quebec City on the same day also to the Canadian National Exhibition Grounds at Toronto and will be made via Montreal, Ottawa and Kingston. These special Air Mail flights are to commemorate not only the golden jubilee of the Canadian National Exhibition, but also the first annual National Aircraft Show. Covers can be sent to any Postmaster along either route and must be prepaid with Canadian postage stamps at the rate of 5c for the first ounce and 10c for each succeeding ounce. The covers must be specially endorsed and each cover will be impressed with a special cachet. If any residents of this Province are interested in first flight covers they may secure any further information by reading the announcement now posted up in the Post Office corridor.

With nearly 100 per cent increase in cattle offering sales were very slow and there were not enough cattle weighted at time of writing to form a basis for quotations. Bulls were likely to be fifty cents lower. No quotations available. Calf receipts 2225. Calves were strong. Grassers sold mostly for \$6.50 or better. Good veals sold around \$12.00 with tops up to \$13.50 and an odd choice veal at \$14.00.

Quotations good veal \$11.50 to \$13.50, medium \$9.50 to \$11.00, common \$8.00 to \$9.50, grassers \$6.00 to \$7.25.
