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Halifax Crescents Lineup Strengthened

HALIFAX, Oct. 22 — (CP) — The line-up of Halifax Crescents of the Maritime Senior Hockey League was strengthened tonight by the arrival of two Torontonians, Joe Szabo and Bill Thompson. Szabo, 24, a right-winger, played last season with Oakland, Cal., of the Pacific Coast League. The 21-year-old Thompson, who can take a turn at left wing or defence, was with Toronto Staffords of the Ontario Hockey Association.

Count Of Cariboo Herds Delayed Another Year

OTTAWA, Oct. 22 — (CP) — The caribou herds which roam the vast expanses of the Northwest Territories will have to remain unnumbered for at least another year, the Northwest Territories Council decided today. Vital as food to the 12,000 inhabitants of the territories, the caribou roam from below the timber line up to the open water of the Arctic straits each summer and many fall prey to the Indians, Eskimos and trappers in isolated areas along the way.

Whether or not the caribou is becoming extinct, as did the famed buffalo of the plains, and as the caribou themselves did in the Ungava area of Hudson Straits, will remain a mystery for the time being. Air Commodore H.B. Gedwin, Air Force representative on the Council, gave the only direct evidence that the caribou are still present in the Territories in large numbers. He reported that an R.C.A.F. plane, flying about 150 miles east of Yellowknife, spotted a herd which continued for 150 miles along the direction of travel.

A survey would entail the employment of a qualified mammalogist, the Council was told, and a direct expenditure of about \$25,000. In addition, the R.C.A.F. would have to undertake some 300 hours of flying. Apart from this expenditure, the Prairie Provinces would have to assist, through agreement with Federal authorities.

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Maple Leafs Come From Behind To Whip Rangers 3-1

MAPLE LEAF GARDENS, TORONTO, Oct. 22 — (CP) — Toronto Maple Leafs came from behind tonight to whip New York Rangers 3-1 before 12,870 fans for their first triumph of the 1947-48 National Hockey League campaign. The win moved the Leafs up into third place in the League standing.

The Stanley Cup champions found the persistent back-checking of the light, fast and pesky Rangers a tough handicap to overcome. They yielded a goal in the first period, but came back for two in the second and a third for good measure in the final session.

Referee Georges Hayes of Ingersoll ruled with an iron hand, imposing 14 penalties, eight in the second period. The Leafs got the winning goal when the Rangers were two men short due to tripping penalties.

Tony Leswick tallied the Rangers' goal, on an assist from Grant Warwick. Gary Stewart got Toronto's equalizer, tipping in a blue line drive by defenceman Bill Barliko. Bill Juzda and Neil Colville were in the penalty box together when Vic Lynn, with Howie Meeker's help, batted in the winning goal. It took the Leafs 52 seconds with a two-man advantage to cage the puck.

Veteran Stu Apps, Toronto captain, made up for a lot of the lethargic play during the game with his tally in the third period. He took a pass from Bill Ezinicki, got the New York defence out of position with a wide shift and then pulled Rayner to his knees to complete a picture play. Each team drew seven of the 14 penalties, the Rangers total including a 10 minute misconduct to Grant Warwick who appeared to make a cutting remark to referee Hayes who ran into several disputes with players over his decisions.

The Leafs had an edge in shots on goal, with 32 to 24 for the Rangers.

Turning aside the Redmen's bid to retain honors won a year ago in Toronto, Varsity edged Montreal's well-balanced team 62 points to 52. University of Western Ontario, led by brothers Bob and Don MacFarlane, placed third with 42 points and Queen's University trailed with three.

Boston Bruins Defeat Montreal Canucks 3-1

BOSTON, Oct. 22 — (CP) — Although out-shot by the top-heavy margin of 20-12, the Boston Bruins pulled out a 3-1 National Hockey League victory over Montreal's fleet Canadians tonight before a capacity 13,900 crowd at the Boston Garden. The Bruins' victory was a short-handed opposition.

Joe Carveth opened the Boston scoring during the fourth minute of play by banging in defenceman Clare Martin's assist from 15 feet out. With two minutes to go and Canadians gambling for a tying counter, they left themselves wide open for a three-man Boston break and rookie Pete Babando beat all-star goalie Bill Durnan with another blistering 15-footer.

The game, officiated tightly by referee Bill Chadwick, had a total of 16 penalties, three of them majors. Freshman Eddie Sandford drew a five-minute sentence for high-sticking Bob Carse late in the first period. Just as Sandford was sent himself, Carse came to blows with Fernie Flaman.

During the second period, defenceman Jack Crawford and Butch Bouchard were sent off 57 seconds apart and later was still in the box when Schmidt rapped in the winning goal.

The Bruins changed lines on the fly while Little Kenny Smith was leading a charge straight down the middle and Schmidt arrived in front of Montreal net just in time to back-hand a drop shot into the far side of Durnan's cage.

Early in the final, Johnny Oulity put Canadians back into the game by whacking in a six-footer after being set up by Roger Leger. From then on the flying Frenchmen tossed caution to the wind as they drove for a tying point. But every time they appeared to be rallying they were checked rudely by a penalty.

HERSHEY, Pa., Oct. 22 — (AP) — Springfield Indians broke into the win column of the American Hockey League for the first time this season by defeating Hershey Bears 4-1 tonight before 5,166 fans.

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 22 — (AP) — Pittsburgh Hornets scored their only goal in the first 15 seconds of play, then had to hold off vigorous thrusts of Cleveland Barons and settle for a 1-1 tie in an American Hockey League game tonight.

OTTAWA, Oct. 22 — (CP) — Ottawa Senators spoiled New York Rangers debut on Ottawa ice tonight by trouncing the visitors 10-2 in a Quebec Senior Hockey League game before an estimated 4,500 fans. It was Rover's second straight licking since entering the League.

PERTH, Australia, Oct. 22 — (CP) — A hard-bitten, 61-year-old Australian miner saved the life of a kitten trapped in a mine shaft by feeding it for six months with t-bits and water lowered 25 feet on string.

Harry Duhlin, the miner, was camping alone by Maritana Shaft, Western Australia, when the playful kitten fell in.

Every time Duhlin climbed down to get it, the kitten ran off into a narrow drive and could not be induced to leave. So pieces of fish, meat scraps, and tins of milk and water were lowered into the shaft — 400 times in all.

The miner repeatedly lowered ropes, and kitted bravely attempted to climb out, but the task was too much for it. At first it reached three feet up, before long 12 feet, but never the top.

But passing time and constant food finally made a cat out of the kitten and gave it the strength it needed. A rough wire cage was lowered, it clambered in and hung on. Then Duhlin hauled it up to the light, half a year older, but more than twice as wise about mine shafts.

Arrest Follows 18-month Search
MONTREAL, Oct. 21 — (CP) — Sought by police for almost 18 months, Antonio Fucy, 46, of Montreal was arrested last night in connection with a \$7,895 holdup of a Canadian Bank of Commerce branch at Selkirk, Ont., May 31, 1946.

Fucy's arrest followed information received by police that he had returned to Montreal after an absence of two years.

VANCOUVER, Oct. 22 — (CP) — The British Columbia government today increased cost of living bonus payments for its 6,000 civil servants. Provincial Secretary George S. Pearson announced a 12 1-2 per cent boost in wages for employees receiving \$160 a month or less and payment of a \$16 a month bonus to all employees receiving more than \$160, effective Nov. 1.

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
