WAR MEMORIAL AT LONG RIVER The German gun which stands on the school grounds at Long River has been painted recently and surrounded by a beautiful fence thus greatly adding to the beauty and attractiveness of an already well kept school ground. This gun should be a constant reminder of the bravery and skill of those who fought for liberty and democracy in the great war. No such war trophy can be exhibited on foreign territory as the Canadian forces through the whole long conflict never lost a gun to the enemy which they did not recapture. At the same time the jagged holes torn through the iron sides of the gun and the partly severed spoke of one wheel bear grim testimony to the horrors of war. It is quite probable that in the capture of this gun some of our Canadian boys made the supreme sacrifice or received wounds from which they suffer till this day. It is to be hoped then that this gun will keep fresh in the minds of the people the names of those who fought so bravely for their country in her hour of trouble and at the same time remind them of the horror, misery and futility of war. To those war veterans who were instrumental in making this trophy so attractive the thanks of the whole community are due. They have again demonstrated their loyalty to their country by beautifying their own district. That the people of this community are proud of the part played by their sons in the great war has been demonstrated in other ways. In the new church at Long River there is a beautiful memorial window dedicated to the Memory of all who served, and at the Geddie Memorial church not far away stands one of the finest monuments that has been erected within the province.

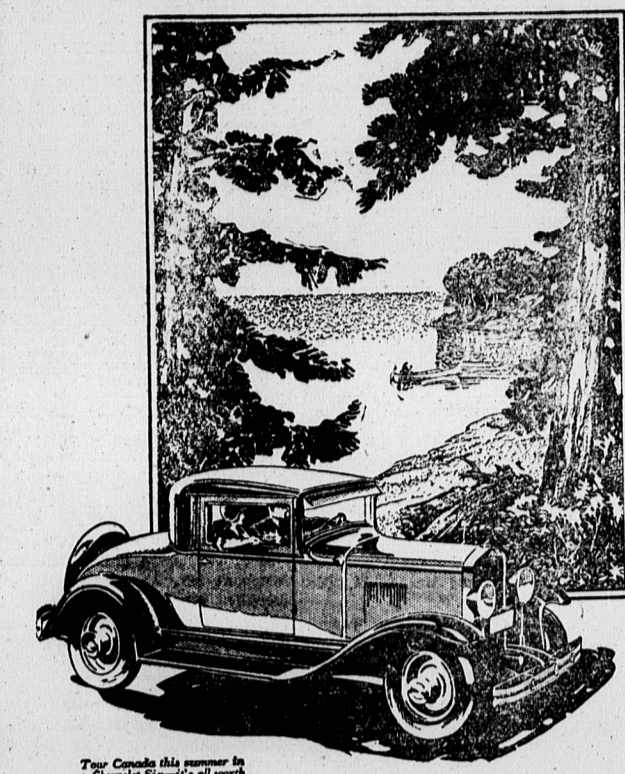

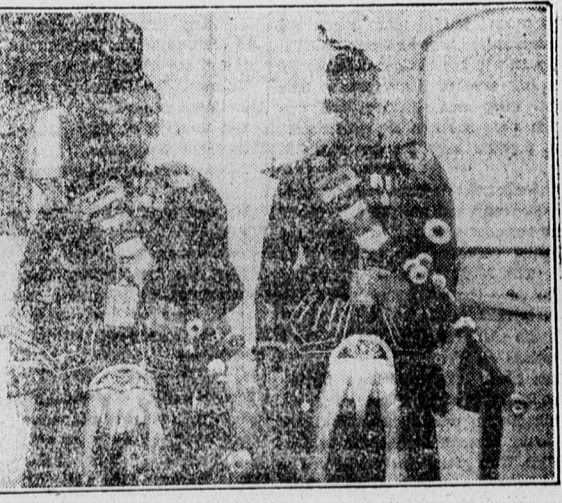
